Introduction



My Tarot Journey

The road of life twists and turns and no two directions are ever the same.

Yet our lessons comefrom thejourney, not the destination.

I have been reading the tarot for over twenty-four years. How I first became interested in the tarot is a little unusual—some would even say unorthodox. So, did an old gypsy woman hand me a battered, faded tarot deck under the light of a full moon? Was I fascinated with the tradition and mystique of the cards? Was I captivated by their images and mysteries? Nope. That fascination and captivation came much later.

I started using tarot cards because it was a way to get folks to relax when I did clairvoyant readings. When I began working the psychic fair circuit, I was a young mother of three in my twenties. I used no props of any kind; I just turned on my tape recorder and focused on the client (classically called a querent), and then I asked to hold their hand and let it rip.

Of course, most people did not care to have me just sit there, some cocky twenty-four-year-old, holding their hand and strolling right through their heads . . . it caught them off-guard and, honestly,

it frightened them. Scaring people was the last thing I wanted to do. With that thought in mind, I watched other readers and realized that the props—flashy tarot cards, candles, and the occasional (albeit cheesy) crystal ball—made their clients relax. We won't mention the readers that wore turbans (I kid you not).

Also, it was the early 1990s; back in the day at the local St. Louis psychic fairs, anyone not using cards was looked upon suspiciously. So, being practical, I went out, found a pretty tarot deck, and memorized those suckers. Just like flash cards, I memorized three basic keywords for each card at first, and that got me up and running. My husband used to sit and hold up a card at random while I fed our babies in their highchairs, so I could practice. And while my toddlers ran amok in my home, I memorized the tarot deck between laundry, dishes, diapers, and family duties. Once I had a basic idea of all seventy-eight cards, I started to seriously study. Typically this study happened during the kids' nap time or in the evenings when the kids were all in bed.

I found a few basic books on tarot that gave me more insight into the cards and their traditional meanings. I practiced performing readings on friends, and then my friends' friends. And then something wonderful happened: I realized that every card had a story to tell. Even before I was a published author, I always had a yen for a good story, and so I began to associate the cards with certain stories and/or people that I knew. Then I began to notice that certain cards falling in a specific position in the reading always meant the same thing, no matter who the querent was. Inspired, I began to use the cards as a springboard and to allow them to open the door to a more refined and detailed psychic reading.

I became thoroughly enchanted by the symbolism and magick in the cards. I found it fascinating, as a Witch, to discover that the suits of the tarot were not only based upon the four elements, but they shared the same basic qualities and meanings as well. The closer I looked at the cards, the more magickal symbolism I found. I began picking up different varieties of tarot decks to experiment with, and my affection and love affair with the tarot became stronger than ever before.

Over the past twenty years I have had a favorite basic tarot deck and a few funky ones, but I never had a tarot deck that felt magickal enough. I had a few Witch-themed decks, but they never truly fit me. Truthfully, they felt a bit tacky, or they were just too off the wall. Plus I found out quickly that folks would react negatively to those old, kitschy Witch-themed decks if I tried using them for public readings, which always made me want to giggle.

I wondered to myself if a strong, elegant deck with classic and beautiful images that Witches could identify with would ever come along. When the opportunity presented itself to design and script a brand-new tarot deck for Witches, well, I thought about it for about a day . . . and then started working. This Witches Tarot deck was a few decades in the wishing and over two-and-a-half years in the physical creation. However, I think you will find it to be worth the wait.

Symbolism: The Language of the Tarot

Symbolism is no mere idle fancy. .. it is inherent in the very texture of human life.

This deck is based on the classic Rider-Waite-Smith deck. If you are familiar with traditional tarot imagery, then you will pick up the basic definitions quickly. I do, however, strongly encourage you to take some time and read the descriptions of each card so you will understand the deeper magickal meanings displayed within them. Use this book to interpret the card meanings for yourself until you become familiar with their specific magickal meanings.

Every individual image portrayed in the scene of a single tarot card is there for a specific reason. Symbolism is the language of the tarot, and there are many different types of symbolism used in the Witches Tarot. It has always been my belief that each card tells its own wonderful story. I encourage you to look carefully at each card in this deck and see what tale it tells you. As you study the art of each card, read along in the book to discover what each flower, landscape, clothing color, jewel, tree, fruit, animal, or elemental creature represents.

Also, you will see that there are keywords of both upright and reversed meanings with each card definition. These will help you to learn the basic meaning of each card a bit more

easily. Correspondences for deities as well as astrological and elemental associations are also listed where applicable. There is also a chapter on magick that features eleven new tarot spells. Also, be sure to refer to the two helpful appendices in the back of the book!

There is one appendix on the meaning of the numbers and the court cards of the Minor Arcana, and another detailed, alphabetized appendix on the common symbols employed in the cards. From a castle on a hillside to the thrones the characters sit in, right down to heraldry on the characters' costumes, I've got you covered. Now all of those symbols and their meanings are right at your witchy fingertips. All of these wonderful resources will help you, the tarot reader and/or Witch, to absorb and to learn the deeper meanings and the enchanting symbolism of the Witches Tarot.

Please note the design on the back of the cards as well, with their fantastic stars in the galaxy and the enchanting triple moon (which is, of course, our Triple Goddess symbol). What better symbol for the card backs in a Witches' deck could there be?

Embrace the magick of these cards, get ready to advance your skills, and enjoy the journey.

Performing a Witches Tarot Reading for Yourself

Reading is to the mind what exercise is to the body.

So, how do you begin, you may wonder? Honestly, it is really very simple. I suggest studying all of the images in the deck and reading through the symbolism and meanings to familiarize yourself a bit with this deck. Once you have done that, you are ready to begin. I

personally like to center myself and find a quiet spot to put myself into a relaxed frame of mind. Sometimes I light a few candles or some incense to help get in the proper meditative state of mind. I make sure that the house is quiet and I will not be interrupted. It is my "me" time.

Doing a tarot reading for yourself is a form of meditation. I know that it always relaxes me, and I constantly learn something new. I encourage you to try it. Your personal readings overall will be much clearer and more enjoyable if you give yourself some meditative time.

Now that you are focused, centered, and calm, decide on your question. Here's a good tip: the simpler the question, the clearer the answer. Shuffle the deck, keeping that question firmly in mind. Choose your card layout, deal the cards, then live on the edge and read them.

Here is a charm to help you to focus. This will assist in easing you into a magickal state of mind for your own personal readings with the Witches Tarot.

Performing a Reading for Another

Each player must accept the cards life deals him or her: but once they are in hand, he or she alone must decide how to play the cards in order to win the game.

Now, when it comes to performing a reading for another, there are some rules you should consider. As I am a practical Witch and an old hand at doing tarot readings for the general public, here are a few realistic and commonsense considerations when it comes to reading your Witches Tarot cards for another.

Ask if the querent/client has ever had a reading before. If not, then take that opportunity to explain what some of the more intense tarot images actually symbolize. This way, you avoid any frights or upsets from the client. For example, the Ten of Swords symbolizes being betrayed or stabbed in the back; the Death card shows change (and typically pops up in readings for pregnant women and people about to get married or head off to college, etc.—after all, their life is about to change forever and in a big way); and the Shadow Side card means facing your fears. So give the client reassurance before their very first reading begins. That way, you can both enjoy the experience.

Ask the querent what specific question they have at the beginning of the reading. Have them hold the question firmly in mind while they shuffle the cards. (Yes, your tarot deck may be handled by

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someone else.) It is best to have the querent/client shuffle and cut the deck themselves before the reading—that way, their energy and actions influence the cards and how they fall. There are some people who insist that you should never let another person handle your cards, but I prefer to let the client shuffle or cut the cards. An easy solution to this dilemma is that if you are doing readings for the public, then you may choose to have a separate deck strictly dedicated for public readings and another set of cards just for your own personal use.

You do not have to read reversed cards—unless you'd like to. I rarely do. Life is full of enough challenges.

Besides, it does occasionally upset folks when they see upsidedown cards. Whether or not you decide to read reversed cards is your personal choice.

Never predict death. Why? Well, odds are that you are wrong. Worse, what if you are wrong and someone decides to take you up on your prediction? In all the

years I have done readings, I can count the number of times on one hand when the cards actually predicted an eminent physical death; each time it was in conjunction with someone inquiring about a relative who was in their final days, battling an illness of some kind.

Know your deck. It really kills the mood and makes you look unprofessional if you have to stop and look up the answers in the book during a public reading. So, if you are doing readings for the public, then know the deck cold. Be sure to take some time to learn the meanings and to practice before you read for the general public. However, if you are doing a reading for a close friend and they don't mind you interpreting their cards straight from the book, then sit back, relax, and have a great time.

Storing your tarot cards. Finally, when you are all through with your reading, your Witches Tarot cards do not have to be wrapped and/or stored in silk. The reason this folklore began is that silk deflects unwanted psychic vibrations—but this is not strictly necessary. If the idea appeals to you, then go for it. I typically place my tarot cards in a drawstring fabric pouch. It's practical—it keeps them clean and together, and it makes it harder to lose a card—and I have different fabrics and various colored drawstring bags for my different decks, so I can tell them apart quickly.

Remember that it is okay to laugh and have fun with a tarot reading. It is also perfectly fine to be more serious and thoughtful. Again, your personal style and your choices should be honored. We are all unique, and that difference gives our tarot readings personality and depth.

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I think that about covers the basics. Enjoy yourself as you learn the deck and read this book. There are some brand-new tarot spreads for you to try out, as well as spells and magick. Let's begin our journey and explore the enchantment and mystery of the Witches Tarot.

The Major arcana

It is a fool's prerogative to utter truths that no one else will speak.

The sequence of the twenty-two cards in the Major Arcana tells us the story of the Fool's journey. With the first card number, 0, we see the Fool begin his quest young, carefree, happy, and open to the experiences of his spiritual passage. By the time the Fool works his way through to the final Major Arcana card, numbered XXI, the World, our traveler is older, wiser, and has embraced the mysteries of his path.

A fascinating note is that the word arcana actually means "mystery." The scenes in the Major Arcana cards show us evocative images and archetypes. These archetypes are symbolic figures such as the Mother, the Father, the High Priest and High Priestess, and the Hero. They appear in various mythologies, religions, and mystery traditions from all over the world. These archetypal images in the Major Arcana are drawn from many magickal cultures. They are truly universal.

At any point in our lives we can embody a Major Arcana card, and we may feel as if we are living with the scene itself. These particular twenty-two cards appeal to our emotions and tug on our heartstrings. The imagery and archetypes within the Majoi Arcana link us all together, as they resonate on a deeper spiritual level. They speak to us by using the common language of emotion, a language everyone speaks.

When Major Arcana cards turn up in a tarot spread, they add weight and importance to the reading. These cards illustrate important spiritual matters, and they reveal our relationship to the particular archetype within the card. When two or more Major Arcana cards are dealt in a reading, then you know that fate is playing a hand in your spiritual path and everyday life. Take comfort in that, as these Major Arcana cards teach you that while things may seem beyond your control, there is a divine, magickal purpose at work here.

The Major Arcana offers you a road map to the mysteries of the Craft and to your spiritual life. All you have to do is be willing to open your eyes, embrace the offered wisdom, and start your travels. May you have a good journey!

THE MAJOR ARCANA

0 • The Fool

he Fool is at the beginning of his spiritual and magickal journey. The Fool is young, open, and daring enough to take a risk and to make a leap of faith. He strolls along at the very edge of the cliff, a green valley below him and" mountains at his back, either unaware or uncaring of the risk. He carries a leather satchel filled with his past experiences on his traveler's staff. These are kept safe and secure by his faith, symbolized by the pentagram that keeps the satchel closed. His bright, colorful costume gives a nod to both his happy mood and his sunny disposition. The red feather in his cap symbolizes his zeal for life and his love of the journey. The Fool has his face tipped up to the bright blue sky and is enjoying the freedom, excitement, and adventure of his journey.

The white rosebud that the Fool carries symbolizes his innocence, his trust, and those new beginnings. The dog portrayed in this card is the Fool's companion and familiar. It prances happily along beside him. West Highland White Terriers (or "Westies," as they are often called) are known for being loyal, energetic, and smart dogs—a perfect companion for the novice traveler.

Meanings

This first Major Arcana card is an excellent illustration of someone who is following their bliss. This card often materializes in a reading when the querent is trying something new and completely different. They may be just beginning their spiritual journey or are exploring a new magickal tradition or path. Perhaps they are taking on a brand-new job or are considering an innovative business opportunity. The Fool encourages us to

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dare, be more open minded, and enjoy the ride. Do not let yourself be dragged down by worries. The Fool laughingly persuades you to trUst and take a chance, and not fret too much about the future—instead, just enjoy the trip and take things one day at a time.

This card is all about the proverbial leap of faith. Sure, it is possible that you might make a mistake or fall down, but hey! You can always get right back up, brush yourself off, and try again. Sometimes that is the best way to learn—by daring to do. At the end of the day, the Fool encourages you to be open to new prospects and ideas. Live on the edge; think outside of the box. Be confident and bold! There is a big, wide, magickal world out there . . . go explore it!

Keywords: Follow your bliss. Adventure, fresh starts, exploration, a journey. New ideas; take a chance and chase your dreams. The beginning of a spiritual quest; exploring a new magickal path or tradition. A leap of faith.

Deity Associations: None, because the Fool represents humanity.

Astrological Association: Uranus.

Reversed: Irresponsibility, recklessness, dangerous and careless behavior. A precarious situation. There is a need to be cautious and plan ahead.

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I • The Magician

he Magician stands behind an altar at dawn, with his pentagram around his neck and magickal symbols embroidered upon his robe. With the wand in his hand he draws a lemniscate, the infinity symbol, in the air above him, reminding us that "As within, so without." With his other hand he points down to the earth to illustrate another classic magickal proverb: "As above, so below." On the altar lie the classic Witch's tools, which are also the symbols of the four suits of the Minor Arcana: the cup to represent the element of water, the sword for air, the hawthorn wand for fire, and the golden pentacle for the element of earth.

The Magician is a commander of the four natural elements. By combining his personal power together with the natural elements, he makes magick through the sheer force of his will. He stands beneath a bower of red roses, which represents harmony. The four lilies in the foreground symbolize the purity of his relationship with deity and his creativity. The four faeries in the card represent each of the four natural elements: the green faerie for earth, red for fire, blue for water, and yellow for air. The faeries fluttering around the Magician's altar show us how he is intimately connected to and has a strong working relationship with the elementals and the awesome powers of the natural world.

Meanings

When this card appears in a reading, it is a message to tap into your own magick to find the answers you seek. Work in balance with the elements and the powers of nature to create your

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magick and bring about positive change. Magick is all around you, and it is everywhere in the natural world...the Magician challenges

you to seek i! out. Connect to this elemental energy and tap into its powers. Be confident and look within as well as without.

This particular Major Arcana card is a lesson in the Hermetic Principle of Correspondence, which teaches us that "As above, so below; as within, so without." We do exist on all planes—on the astral/spiritual, the energetic, and the physical. The Magician urges you to choose the most harmonious tools and natural accessories for your magick. Use the laws of correspondence and all of the resources that you have at your disposal wisely.

Keywords: As above, so below. Skill, determination, connection, confidence. Strength of will. Working magick with the four elements and the elemental spirits. The Hermetic Principle of Correspondence. Elemental magick and personal power.

Deity Associations: Hermes, Thoth, Mercury, Hermes Trismegistus.

Astrological Association: Mercury.

Reversed: Lack of confidence, poor communication with others, manipulative magick.

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Il • The High Priestess

he High Priestess before you is powerful, mystical, wise, and compelling. She is serious, kind, just, and compassionate. This is the Maiden aspect of the Goddess, and her wisdom is all-encompassing. The High Priestess wears an ethereal silver gown and royal blue hooded cape as she sits in contemplation upon her throne, her feline familiar sitting calmly at her side. The blue sky and nature are her backdrop, and the moon and the stars of the cosmos are at her feet. Pomegranates grow lushly around her, and she is stationed evenly between the two lunar pillars. The High Priestess is calm and in control of the occult powers she wields. She does not lean towards the waxing energies or towards the waning energies of the moon, as she is not inclined to the light or the dark. The High Priestess is centered and neutral.

The High Priestess wears a Triple Goddess crown and a necklace of amber and jet stones to denote her rank. Amber increases mental power and jet enhances psychic abilities, both important qualities for the High Priestess. In her hands she holds a scroll for knowledge and blooming sage, which represents wisdom. The pomegranates are sacred to the goddess Persephone, and they signify royalty and elegance. The young black cat, the classic Witch's familiar, represents the feminine mysteries of the Craft.

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Meanings

When this card appears in a reading, it often marks a time of initiation and learning. The Maiden Goddess is challenging

you. Be wise and listen to her words of wisdom. This card is a reminder to quietly and calmly seek occult knowledge and look within. Use your intuition and trust your instincts. This is not the time to let your emotions rule you; instead, it is an opportunity for growth and a chance to gain real insight and understanding. The High Priestess teaches you to be strong, wise, and steady. She quietly shows you that in order to attain real wisdom you must remember to always work your magick thoughtfully and from a place of neutrality.

Keywords: The Maiden aspect of the Goddess. Neutrality, initiation, wisdom. Inner knowledge, intuition. Lunar energy and magick, waxing moon magick, the feminine mysteries of the Craft.

Deity Associations: Artemis/Diana, Persephone, the Maiden Goddess.

Astrological Association: Moon.

Reversed: Being out of balance. Repressed feelings, a refusal to learn and grow, unrecognized potential.

he Empress is seated on a cushioned golden throne surrounded by nature. Her throne is embellished with patterns of five-petaled roses and wheat. The five-petaled flower creates a natural pentagram, and the flowers and sheaves of wheat link her back to the ancient mother goddesses Demeter and Isis. The Empress is pregnant in this card, indicating her fertility. She is the great Mother Goddess, and the twelve stars that form a halo around her head represent the signs of the zodiac. She holds in her hand a scepter, denoting her power over all of the natural world. The beautiful Empress wears a rich green gown, another link to the powers of life, growth, and nature. The nine pearls around the Empress's throat symbolize the nine classic planets, and pearls are a symbol for basic organic creativity.

A heart-shaped copper shield with a stylized Venus symbol rests to the side of her throne. This card has the astrological association of the planet Venus, and copper is the metal associated with that planet. The Empress's shield reminds us to protect and cherish the love in our lives. The lush forests, green grass, and the river that cascades down the slope are more depictions of sacred feminine symbolism. The background sky with the heavy gray clouds holds the promise of rain and life coming to the land. The wildflowers and wheat growing in the foreground of the scene correspond to the abundance of the harvest, and they represent prosperity and resources. Finally, the rabbit that sits contentedly at the Empress's feet is another nod to the energy and awesome powers of fertility, creation, and nature.

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Meanings

This is the motherhood, fertility, and power-of-nature card.

When this card appears in a reading, it is a message from the Mother Goddess to respect the force and power of nature and the body's ability to reproduce. If the Empress card appears in a reading along with the Ace of Wands or the Ace of Cups, then it symbolizes pregnancy or that conception may be likely at this time. This card can also indicate an opportunity to bring new, creative ideas into the world. Protect and cherish the loving relationships in your life. Focus on your family and your home, and enjoy the energy and excitement your children bring into your life. "Birth" your new ideas. Embrace creativity and your own sexuality, and work joyously and respectfully with the powers of nature.

Keywords: The Mother aspect of the Goddess. Bringing new ideas into existence. Feminine power, love, sexuality, motherhood. Fertility, birth, creativity. Hearth and home, protecting love in your life, full moon magick. The power of nature.

Deity Associations: Aphrodite/Venus, Demeter, Gaia, Isis, Inanna, Mother Nature, the Mother Goddess, Selene.

Astrological Association: Venus.

Reversed: Domestic problems, infertility, problems with parental or romantic relationships.

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he wise Emperor watches over his children as they play happily in the background. To denote his power, he holds a scepter topped by an ankh in his right hand. In his left hand he holds a globe. He wears a purple cape to represent his sovereignty. The mountains behind him symbolize his strength and steadfastness. The Emperor is surveying the scene and considering his options and plans for the future. He is a wise, kind ruler and a loving father figure. This card has the astrological association of Aries, which is represented by the ram's heads in the carved arms of the throne and the Aries symbol on the Emperor's armor.

This is the masculine characteristic of deity, the God aspect and the divine father. The purple tulips in the foreground symbolize royalty, while the blooming sorrel growing at his feet represents parental affection. Interestingly, the Emperor has no weapons and instead uses the power of his wisdom and experience to rule and to keep the peace.

Meanings

This card may symbolize a leader of a family or a magickal group— a responsible, balanced person. Just as the Emperor is doing in this card, you should calmly survey your situation and carefully consider your options. This card may stand for your boss at work (no matter what their gender), not just a husband or a father. The Emperor card will often appear in a reading when you are up for a promotion at work, about to earn a higher degree in your coven, or even if you are taking a new job with better prospects. If you find yourself standing as the head

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of the family or coven and are the peacemaker and arbitrator, it is possible this card may represent your role within the group. It can also symbolize your leadership within a family dynamic or at your place of employment.

Keywords: Leader of a family or coven. Father figure, family man, loving husband and/or father. Sovereignty, reason. Masculine energy, protection. A responsible and balanced person.

Deity Associations: Osirus, Zeus, Jupiter, Divine Father.

Astrological Association: Aries.

Reversed: Lack of self-discipline, authority issues, inferiority, issues with parents.

 ${\tt V}$ • The High Priest



he High Priest sits on a stone bench at the temple. He is an elegant older gentleman, one of the Wise Ones. He wears a rich, flowing, regal scarlet robe, and his silver pentagram—a symbol of magickal power and personal protection—is displayed proudly upon his chest. The position of his right hand—two fingers up and two fingers down—and the wooden staff he holds in his left hand are classic tarot symbols. They represent balance between the worlds of the physical and the spiritual. The three crosspieces of the staff correspond to the upperworld, the middleworld, and the underworld.

In the background we see mountains and a lush natural setting. In the foreground a long shadow is cast. Two large skeleton keys hover in the air before the High Priest. These two prominent skeleton keys represent the divine feminine and the divine masculine, represented by the moon with its silver lunar key and the sun with its golden solar key, respectively. One of the many names for this card is the Hierophant. The High Priest is an authority figure, a counselor, and the keeper of magickal traditions and knowledge.

Meanings

When this card appears in a reading, it means that there are questions that need answering and advice to be sought. Classically this card denotes a need for legal advice or counseling. It may also indicate a course of study or furthering your education or the need to settle disputes in a coven. But remember that the High Priest is the wise and patient counselor, an elder, and a teacher. He does not give you all the answers to your questions;

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instead, he helps you figure out where to look to find your own truths. He places in your hands the keys to unlock the mysteries and to gain deeper knowledge, then trusts that you will find the answers yourself, using the lessons he has so carefully taught you.

Keywords: Possible legal matters to attend to. Counseling, settling disputes in a coven, upholding tradition, preserving magickal wisdom. Understanding the mysteries of the Craft, furthering your education, uncovering your personal truths.

Deity Associations: Horus, Jupiter, Mithras, the Sage.

Astrological Association: Taurus.

Reversed: Receiving unreliable or unsuitable advice, making a hasty or poor decision, expecting others to make decisions for you.

pair of young lovers share an intimate moment in a beautiful spring garden filled with blooming trees, flowers, and a stream. Above and behind the couple, coming out of the clouds, an angel watches over the pair. The sun illuminates the winged angel, and the angel is reaching out and blessing the bond between the couple in a shower of beautiful, glowing light. Representing harmony and messages, the angel gently reminds us that love enlightens and heals.

The couple is on the verge of a kiss. Romance is in the air, and once the couple does kiss, their emotional commitment begins and their destinies will forever be entwined. They are about to discover whether they have chosen well.

The Lovers card is a card of choices made and romance. It is a wonderful illustration of the balance of opposites and the power of attraction. She has six pink roses in her red hair; the six roses are a nod to the number of this card, which symbolizes a balance of opposites. Pink roses, in particular, stand for a romantic love. In bloom at the couple's feet are daffodils and hyacinths. These magickal flowers add the enchantment of chivalry and new love to the meaning of this card.

The Lovers is a card of relationships and choice. This card illustrates the power of love, desire, destiny, romance, and attraction. It celebrates challenges overcome so that two lovers can be together. The angel in this Major Arcana card may be thought of as a matchmaker, but she may also be a protective force for the couple. The angel is a symbol of destiny. She is there to show us how every choice we make can affect our future. The angel reminds us to choose wisely.

Keywords: Sexual love, beauty, a romantic relationship. Decisions, commitment. Choices to be made. The choice you make now will affect your future. Love heals.

n armor-clad charioteer stands inside his gold and silver chariot as he races his horses through the clouds and across the sky. In the background we see a crescent moon, starry skies, and the sunrise's lighter sky beneath him. On the charioteer's helmet is an eight-pointed star. This is the star of Venus, a symbol of healing. Across his armor is a golden sash bearing the signs of the zodiac. Rather than being ruled by those forces, the charioteer directs them and harnesses these powers to create the outcome that he desires—just as we see him controlling the pair of horses and keeping them moving forward together.

This is a card that speaks of hard-won victories. The Chariot card is all about self-confidence, control, motivation, and the determination to succeed. Tap into your own personal power and you will see your goals manifest. Obstacles and blocks will be removed. Work magick for movement and change. When the Chariot comes roaring into a reading, it is a message to combine your magick with mental discipline and tenacity. Power comes from within. Believe in yourself combine determination, focus, and willpower—and you will succeed. In the Major Arcana, only the Chariot, the High Priestess, and the Star cards have starry skies. These three cards are linked. If the High Priestess appears in a reading with the Chariot, it is a sign that victory can be obtained through wisdom. If the Star appears in a reading with the Chariot, it is a sign that the victory will bring an emotional healing.

When this card turns up in a reading, it is a reminder that brute force is not necessary in the; current situation; however, the wise use of personal power, selfcontrol, determination, and strength of character are. Sometimes the strongest thing we can do is to have confidence In

ourselves and our personal power—to be strong enough to work calmly and with determination through any challenges we may face, carefully and in complete control of ourselves.

He wears a classic wizard's cloak covered with moons and stars, but the cloak is old, faded, and a bit ragged at the edges, showing us that he has been traveling for a while. Under the twilight sky a desolate snow- and ice-covered mountain range appears behind him, symbolizing his separation from the rest of the world. The Hermit uses his traveler's staff to help him on his journey. In his right hand he holds aloft an old metal lantern with a glowing six-pointed star held inside to light his way. A six-pointed star symbolizes the balance between masculine and feminine energies.

The Hermit's glowing star also reminds us to seek our spiritual truths both within and without. The star represents the wisdom that we all hold within. When this is allowed to shine forth, wondrous things can happen. If we have the strength, we can travel to the top of the mountain, gain insight, and see his light for ourselves. The Hermit gains experience through his trials and tests, and he reminds us that we can do the same. Knowledge, inspiration, and enlightenment can be ours.

Meanings

The Hermit card is all about taking purposeful time off, standing alone, and looking within. When this card appears in a read wing, it is a sign that you need to take some downtime for yourself and regroup. Now is the time for vision questing, reflection, intuition, meditation, and self-development. It is time to work

The four seasons and their corresponding tarot suits are illustrated together. The earth element is represented by the pentacle and the winter solstice with holly, the classic Yuletide plant. In magickal herbalism holly is used for good luck and protection. In the bottom right we see pink cherry blossoms for the spring equinox together with the sword, which are both associated with the element of air. The cherry blossoms, a classic spring flowering tree, signify nobility and chivalry. In the bottom left corner there are vibrant green oak leaves for the summer solstice and the blooming hawthorn wand from our deck. Both the wand and the season of summer correspond beautifully with the element of fire. Here, the foliage of the midsummer oak represents health, wisdom, virtue, and long life. Finally, in the upper left-hand corner of the card, we see an enchanting mixture of beautiful orange maple leaves in the autumn combined with acorns for the harvest. The cups suit is aligned with the autumn season, as autumn is linked to the element of water. The maple leaves symbolize elegance, beauty, and energy, while the acorns bring prosperity and wisdom.

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44 Meanings This card symbolizes the magick of the four seasons and the energies of the Wheel of the Year. When this card turns up in a reading, it is a message to work with the energies and the cycles of nature that are currently around you, and not against them. This means rest and introspection in the winter; new beginnings, growth, and opportunities in the spring; energy, excitement, bounty, and vibrancy in the summer; and abundance and reminders to prepare, gather, and remember in the autumn. Expect there to be change, as all of life is forever transforming and growing. This card classically represents good luck, opportunity, and a fortuitous event.

No one can see through the purple curtain behind her, as it conceals the mysteries and the inner workings of the universe.

This is the central card of the twenty-two Major Arcana cards, since Justice is at the center of our lives and she will have her impartial outcome. Themis treats all with integrity and reverence, as she is, in essence, a neutral force. Justice reminds us of the laws of karma and the idea of cause and effect. What we have done in the past and do now in the present will affect our future.

The Justice card illustrates equilibrium, balance, and fairness. It is time to weigh your options and to assess your actions in life. The black-eyed Susans growing in the Grecian urns ele gantly symbolize justice in the language of flowers. The Justice card is connected to both the High Priestess and the Karma Major Arcana cards. Like the High Priestess, Justice is a neutral force, and its links to the Karma card remind us that, in the end, karma will always have its way.

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Meanings

When the Justice card appears in a reading, you need to ask yourself what is out of balance and what sort of justice you are looking for. What is it that seems so unfair in your life? What actions of yours have brought you to this point? This card can represent legal matters and a possible court case. It can also symbolize a restoration of balance. young man is calmly hanging upside down from his right foot on an ash tree. While he hangs there he is in a transitional state or undergoing an initiation of some kind. The halo around the Hanged Man's face shows him to be experiencing an epiphany. The peaceful skies in the background of this card tell you this phase is not a time to fear. You need to let go of something old and hurtful in order to gain this new wisdom. Enjoy this new perspective and in-between chapter of your life, and see what you discover.

In the Norse Pagan tradition, the world tree Yggdrasil supports the entire universe. The raven is a totem to the god Odin, and the bird symbolizes initiation, secrets, and prophecy. Just as Odin hung on the world tree to gain the knowledge of the runes, the Hanged Man also finds his answers on the ash tree during this transitional phase of life.

The raven holds a sparkling golden pentagram and looks down on the Hanged Man as if to ask what he is doing there. Perhaps this is his totem animal and it is keeping the Hanged Man company during his transitional state. Ravens are magickal, clever, and playful birds. They are attracted to sparkling and shiny objects and will cache them. The classic colors of red, green, yellow, and blue speak of balance within the four natural elements, and these colors make up the Hanged Man's costume. The runes embroidered around the neck of his shirt and decorating the trunk of the ash tree are a link back to Odin; the world tree, and the wisdom found there.

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Meanings

When this card appears in a reading, it is a message to look at things from a different viewpoint. Embrace the idea of initiation as a vehicle to newer wisdom and a clearer spiritual path. Let go of the illusion of control, turn things on their heads, and look carefully at the lessons before you. In this card, Death's skull is lit with a glowing fire. The skull is a symbol of human mortality, and it is the seat of the mind. The greenish-yellow flames represent the mind's energy and power. Death's armor is dark and well used; his white horse has glowing eyes and a bridle with skull-andcrossbones trim. Death carries a flag that announces transformation. The flag is emblazoned with the number thirteen—the number of full moons in a year—and the flower on the flag is a five-petaled white rose, symbolizing the natural cycles of life. The brilliant red skies of sunset in the background correspond to the close of the day and the close of one chapter in your life.

A child stands before Death with an offering of a bouquet of white daisies bound together with ribbons in the Triple Goddess colors of white, red, and black. In the language of flowers, white daisies symbolize innocence. It is important to note that the child is looking up and facing Death while holding out the flowers. He is happy, trusting, and unafraid of this knight; he welcomes the change. The child represents hope.

Meanings

This card represents change. In order for something new to grow, something old has to give way. This card often shows up in readings for pregnant women, which makes sense. Think about it: their way of life is about to change forever. Their lives are about to transform into something else new and exciting.

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This card also symbolizes other important endings and beginnings in your life: birth, marriage, new job, leaving for college, moving, etc.

Basically, one way of life is gone, allowing room for new beginnings and opportunities to emerge.

The clothes of the man and woman are dark and dreary, representing their unhappiness at being in a dark place in their lives. The posture and expressions of the couple illustrate their fear and show that they have inadvertently given away their power to someone or something else. Running and hiding from the shadowy creature is not helping the couple, nor are they finding any comfort. Instead they must turn and face their fears, and stop letting situations and people frighten, intimidate, or upset them.

We all must walk through dark times now and again. The question is, are you going to rise to the occasion and defeat your fears? Will you face the challenging people in your life and deal with the situations head-on, or will you whimper and fret about it? Face your adversaries and fight back with honor and integrity, and you will defeat those who challenge you.

Meanings

This card symbolizes that you are allowing someone else or a situation to have power over you. The old coven-mate who left in high drama, the in-law from hell, or the boss you cannot please—this is a person who can walk into a room and ruin your day . . . because you let them. Within the tower a fire burns, which cleanses and transforms. figures fall from the tower, and they are tumbling headfirst. This shows us that this event is completely out of their control.

The tower symbolizes our ambitions, while the ruby-studded crown represents the ego. In magickal traditions, rubies are used to intensify awareness. The lightning bolt in this scene represents that there is now a flash of insight, and the bright light of truth will illuminate any questionable situation. Blocks are being removed, and negative energy is finally being broken through. Transformation is occurring; reevaluation is necessary at this time. You are being forced out of your comfortable little world . . . now you will have to deal with the aftermath.

A large star shines in the nighttime sky, surrounded by seven smaller stars. Each star has eight rays shimmering out from it. The eight-rayed star is a symbol of healing, and it is an emblem of the goddess Venus, whom the evening star was named after. The glowing stars depicted in this card remind you to follow your dreams, to work with the quiet tides and energies of the stars, and that wishes will be fulfilled at this time. Around the Star Goddess and on the banks grow blue forget-menots. The forget-menot flowers, also sacred to the goddess Venus, represent hope and love.

Not unlike the Temperance card, the Star Goddess is working between the worlds in this depiction. To be "between" is one of the most magickal of places. The sacred ibis bird standing on the log at the shore represents Thoth, an Egyptian god of divine wisdom and science. Thoth was the inventor of astronomy and was considered patron to the art of magick.

Meanings

The Star is a card of hope, inner peace, creativity, and healing. When this beautiful, tranquil card turns up in a reading, it is a sign that physical and emotional healing is on the way. Have hope, follow your dreams, and your wishes will be granted.

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This card speaks of inspiration; your creativity will flow better than ever before. Let it fill you up, and see where it leads you. The Star

illustrates a softer, gentler magick and indicates that you will be working successfully with your intuitive gifts. Also, astrological timing is imperative to any magick performed at this time.

She could appear in any number of guises—as a beautiful maiden, a matron, or as the crone and guide, as she is depicted here. A crone is a woman of power—a woman who has acquired great knowledge in her lifetime, who walks with wisdom, and who wears her years beautifully.

Hecate's trio of companion wolves represent the wilder aspects of ourselves. Hecate was always accompanied by canines, both wild and domestic. The two willow trees in the background are sacred to Hecate, and the willow corresponds both with the element of water and with lunar magick.

Hecate shows us that there is more to be seen than we would first imagine, such as a crone who is beautiful instead of haggard and wizened. Magick is everywhere, even in the most unsuspecting of places. Look carefully now—what will Hecate and the light of the moon reveal to you?

This is the card of the Crone Goddess, waning moon magick, intuition, and illusions. It may also represent a development of psychic powers. 

Purple is powerful and it is both a spiritual and an intuitive color—a good choice for this card. In the distance are a green field and mountains. Those mountains are a classic symbol for this card and are believed to represent abstract thoughts. The light is strange, as, with the eclipse occurring, it is both day and night.

The eclipse reminds us that forces greater than yourself are at work here. he World card symbolizes the end of the Fool's travels and is a culmination of all the cards before it. He has worked his way through the mysteries of the Major Arcana and has found completion. The Fool is shown in the upper left-hand corner. He is older and wiser now that he has completed his magickal journey. In the other three corners of the World card we have representations of the gifts he has acquired while on his expedition. In the upper right-hand corner, a golden eagle soars through the sky. The eagle stands for the gifts of intelligence, courage, and confidence. In the lower right, we see an adult male lion. The lion signifies the gifts of strength, passion, and rebirth that the Fool has now obtained. In the lower left-hand corner is a powerful stag. The stag symbolizes pride, poise, and integrity. Our wiser and older Fool can now easily put to use all of these skills both in his magick and in his daily life.

The Green Man in the center of the World card smiles out at us with foliage surrounding his face and branches crowning him. The branches coming from the top of the Green Man are a nod to the antlers of the horned god of nature. For Witches, the Green Man is a beautiful and evocative representation, or archetype, of the awesome powers and magick of the natural world. It is a perfect representation for the final card of the Major Arcana, as the Green Man and the World card are both symbols of renaissance, rebirth, and regeneration.

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Meanings

When this card appears in a reading, it is a sign that spiritual lessons have been mastered. There is a sense of freedom and harmony to be enjoyed. Newly acquired knowledge, strength, and even spiritual understanding will now be put to good use. It may also symbolize successful completion of a project, a personal renaissance, or even strong and healthy spiritual connections between people and/or coven members.

Keywords: Rebirth, wholeness, completion, joy. Victory and achievement. A journey's successful end. The magick and wonder of the natural world. Spiritual connections between people and/or coven members.

Deity Associations: The Green Man, Gaia.

Astrological Association: Saturn.

Reversed: Delayed completion of a project. Recurring problems. Turning your back on the magick of the natural world.

THE ARCANA

The Minor nrcana

In the tarot, as in magic, the four emblems stand for the world itselfand for human nature...

RACHEL POLLACK

The Minor Arcana consists of four different suits: cups, swords, wands, and pentacles. Each of these suits aligns with one of the four natural elements. Many tarot readers forget that the suits are, in fact, based upon the four elements. In this deck the elements are prevalent and affect the situation in each card.

In the Minor Arcana and within each of the four suits there are two different sets of cards. To begin, we have "the pips," or numbered cards, the ace through ten. The second set of cards in the Minor Arcana are the court cards—these being the page, the knight, the queen, and the king. In the Witches Tarot deck, each of the court cards has an enchanting personal message, challenge, or lesson for you, so read them carefully.

The suits of wands and swords are considered to have masculine energies assigned to their respective elemental rulers of fire and air. These suits are considered active, while the suits of cups and pentacles are feminine. The water and earth suits are passive.

It is also interesting to note that, in readings, the suits of pentacles (earth) and wands (fire) represent physical activities, while the suits of cups (water) and swords (air) symbolize the emotions that are being felt. The different elements characterize not only different experiences but also very different ways of approaching the challenges in your life.

Modern tarot decks based on the Rider-Waite-Smith deck follow the Golden Dawn standard, as does this deck. That is to say, they assign the element of air to the swords and the element of fire to the wands. While it may seem reversed to modern-day Witches, this is classic imagery. For this deck I wanted the card images to have a witchy flair, with images and meanings that are easily recognizable to avoid confusion. This way, the card reader will be able to easily flow with their readings.

While doing a reading, it is distracting to have to pause, look at a card, and wonder, "Wait a minute—what card is that?" Or worse, to have to waste time or ruin the flow of the reading while you search your memory for a more familiar or classic image of a card, and then transpose the definition onto the deck you are currently using.

In closing, the Minor Arcana—both pip and court cards—shows us the everyday, ordinary situations and personalities that we deal with and face in our lives. The Minor Arcana cards bring meaning to events and clarity to the challenges we face, and provide illumination to the common questions we ask.

Cups

Life's enchanted cup sparkles near the brim.

LORD BYRON

The suit of cups symbolizes the element of water and all the magickal associations that flow from this element, such as psychic abilities, love, and emotion. Cups cards flow down a path to understanding through love, inspiration, and imagination. This suit illustrates the power of emotions, friendship, family, romance, and relationships. It explores how we are connected to each other. The element of water, in all its many forms, is celebrated in this suit—from misty, rainy skies to ponds, fountains, calm lakes, rivers and streams, waterfalls, gorgeous beaches, and moody oceans. Plus we'll meet a few of the magickal creatures who dwell there. The elemental beings associated with cups and water are the mermaids, and they do make an appearance in this suit. Some of the creatures aligned with the element of water are also depicted in the suit of cups—look for dolphins and a fish with a secret.

There are also plants, trees, flowers, and their respective magick incorporated in the card images. The flowers shown in the cups suit are associated with the element of water, such as foxgloves, water lilies, iris, violets, pansies, and roses. There is also a lunar pumpkin and a willow tree, both associated with the element of water as well. Each of their messages is explained in the individual meanings of their cards.

The suit of cups is aligned to people born under a watery zodiat sign: Cancer, Scorpio, and Pisces. Physically the court cards of the cups suit represent people who have light brown to blond hair and blue or green eyes. In addition, individuals who are drawn to the cups suit may be romantic, sensitive, psychic, and very empathic, and they may let their emotions lead the way. They are the dreamers and the mystics of the world.

Rce of Cups

he Ace of Cups floats on the surface of a shimmering lake at dawn. The silver cup with a stylized scallop design is surrounded by blooming pink water lilies and green lily pads. The cup is overflowing with water all on its own, and there are four streams of water—one for each direction and element—spilling over the edge of the silver cup and back down into the lake, returning the water to its source. In the background the sun rises over the brim of the cup, signaling the birth of a new day. The feminine element of water is the focus of this card. The cup, or chalice, is a time-honored symbol of the Divine Feminine. The cup is thought of as the womb from which all life flows. This particular ace is an auspicious card for personal relationships, as this suit is aligned with love and emotions. The Ace of Cups also symbolizes opportunities that come out of the blue and emotional growth and the gifts that come with it. The Ace of Cups tells us that the time is now for new and creative projects, divine inspiration, a new romance, a new life, and fresh starts.

Meanings

The Ace of Cups is the most potent and pure form of the feminine element of water. When the Ace of Cups appears in a reading, it proclaims birth, growth, love, and clairvoyance. This card often appears when a pregnancy is about to be announced or confirmed. However, there is more to the Ace of Cups than just physical birth. It does symbolize a wedding, a happy marriage, a healthy relationship, and a loving family. It may also be a symbol for emotional growth and healing. Remember, too, that the

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element of water is associated with psychic powers, creativity, imagination, and spiritual and emotional fulfillment. Gaze into the

surface of that overflowing silver cup... what new, enchanting things are about to be birthed into your world?

Keywords: Births, weddings, happy news and celebrations. Romance and relationships. An emotional beginning. Psychic powers, creativity, and healing. The element of water.

Reversed: Selfishness. Your ego is getting in the way of your success.

Two of Caps

Where the rim of the silver cups touch, there is a bright, glowing light radiating out.

Both the man and woman have a chaplet, or wreath, of flowers in their hair, made of violets, white roses, white and purple pansies, and deep green ivy. The violets are sacred to the goddess Venus, and these flowers speak of a faithful lover. The white roses in the couple's chaplets symbolize new beginnings and true love. The cheerful pansies tell us that the couple shares loving thoughts, and the ivy represents the fidelity of marriage vows held sacred.

Meanings

The Tvo of Cups represents relationships specifically between two people. This card symbolizes balance and equality. Here is a magickal union that binds together heart, body, and soul in the best possible way. When this card sails into a reading, it symbolizes romance, an engagement, or a happy marriage or romantic relationship. This card may also be a sign of an upcoming wedding or handfasting ceremony, depending on the cards that fall around it, such as the Four of Wands. The TWO

coven of three women are grouped together and facing each other. Each woman holds up a silver cup as if they are celebrating and toasting their group's success. To further reinforce the element of water and its magick, we see a flowing waterfall and stream in the background. The women are wearing flowing, colorful gowns with mystical symbols on them, and their magickal silver jewelry sparkles in the sunlight as they appear to be quietly celebrating a sabbat, perhaps Midsummer, in the garden.

The trinity of women are surrounded by many different kinds of magickal flowers. Each of the flowers in this card are associated with the element of water. The tall, rosy-purple foxgloves represent Faery magick and protection. The irises whisper of magickal messages and the communication that flows between the coven members. The pansies, also known as heart's ease, show that they all think kindly of each other, while the violets are blessings from the Goddess and the faeries. Finally, the pink roses announce a real and lasting friendship. This card illustrates the power of three, and there are three trinities in the card: the three women, the three cups, and the three tall spires of the magickal foxglove plant.

Meanings

When this card flows into a reading, it is a reminder of the bonds of magick and friendship, and it is an illustration of the power of three. Your magick is manifesting at this time, whether you have cast your spells as a solitary or with your beloved friends and members of your coven. Magick is all

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around—and it is working. Expect growth, success, and creativity. Your goals are coming to fruition. This card represents a magickal friendship that brings delight and enchantment into your life. It may


also indicate spiritual or psychic growth, gaining a new degree in your coven, or advancing in your course of magickal studies.

Keywords: A happy occasion. A gathering of friends, family, or coven members to celebrate. The power of three and the magick of manifestation. Observing the sabbats, sharing experiences. Magickal advancement, psychic growth, the bonds of a healthy magickal friendship. Growth, success, creativity.

Reversed: Self-centeredness. Strife within the coven. Your magick has come up against roadblocks.

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Four of Cups

Help is coming from an unexpected place. Snap out

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of it! Be thankful for the blessings in your life and reevaluate where you currently stand.

Keywords: Snap out of the funk you are in! Change, adventure, and opportunity await you. Quit moping and do something positive. Assistance is coming from an unexpected place.

Reversed: Self-pity, self-indulgence, depression.

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beautiful elemental creature, a mermaid, is on the shore, sitting on rocks. She is moody, dangerous, intense, and clearly bored with her world. Her hair and scales are a deep, intense, shimmery turquoise color. The sea seems to be taking on the temperament of the mermaid and is also a cloudy and dark blue-green. The surf is hitting the rocks behind her, showing her turbulent mood, and around the mermaid is a collection of her treasures from the sea. The gold coins are unnoticed, and her lunar crown of pearls brings her no joy. There are five silver cups in front of her, and while two of the cups are upright, three have tipped over and are spilling water out and back into the sea. The mermaid looks unhappy, as if her treasures no longer bring her pleasure. Like the classic folktale of the mermaid who longs to be on land and leave her watery kingdom behind, this mermaid has turned her back on the sea and is longing for something she cannot have.

Meanings

This card symbolizes dissatisfaction, being pessimistic, and yearning for something you can never have. Out of the five silver cups that are presented in this card, two of the cups are still full. It is interesting to note that most people only notice that three of the cups have spilled their contents out. When this card washes up in a reading, it is a warning that boredom, minor disappointment, and moodiness are taking over your life. You are wanting what you cannot have or things that will not be good for you in the long run. It may feel awful at the moment, and things you once delighted in may seem uninteresting to

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you now, but it's time to stop being melodramatic and to look around yourself carefully. You still have options and opportunities. Tap into

the element of water, wash away your doldrums, and find solace and peace.

Keywords: Dissatisfaction, disappointment, moping, moodiness, melodrama. Wanting things you cannot have or that will not be beneficial in the long run. Allow the element of water to wash away your doldrums.

Reversed: Loss, remorse, minor depression, sadness.

wo adorable blond children, a brother and sister, sit happily in the green grass and clover on a bright summer afternoon. They have arranged Sweet William flowers in six silver cups. Both of the children wear a watery shade of blue, and their clothes are practical and sturdy for playing outside. A pump bubbles out water to drink, should the children wish for it, and a quiet, shallow stream flows gently through the landscape. The little stream is deep enough to splash in and safe for the children to play by. Peaceful blue skies and a thatched cottage can be seen in the background. This is a simple time of tranquility, enchantment, and innocence. The siblings are creating happy memories while they play together. Life is uncomplicated, and children are very close to magick. Magick is never questioned by children ... it simply is. In this card, imagination rules their world. The memories they are making are joyful and sweet. In the language of flowers, the Sweet William blossoms represent childhood and sweet memories.

Meanings

This card symbolizes happy memories from your childhood, old friends and family, and your past. It can indicate reunions—a surprise visit from a family member or classmate whom you may not have seen in years, a forgotten friend from your old stomping grounds, a former coven member who moved away, or a childhood sweetheart who may be making a return appearance in your life. The Six of Cups card may also be a notice that you need to adopt a more childlike type of wonder for the world

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around you. Let your imagination guide you into a new, creative project. Believe in magick again.

Keywords: Happy memories, old friends, childhood, family and school reunions. Let your imagination soar. Believe in magick again.

Reversed: Unhappy memories. Feeling sad over an ended relationship. Losing your joy in magick.

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Inside of each cup there is something wonderful, magickal, and different. A white-haired and bearded wizard with half-moon glasses is in the foreground. He wears flowing, watery blue robes with magickal symbols embroidered upon them. The third cup's fairy-tale castle offers you the chance of stability, comfort, and the magick of hearth and home. The fourth cup shows you

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a rainbow—time to work on your communication skills and see what messages await you on Iris's magickal rainbow from the Temperance card. The fifth card holds jewels and gold coins, inviting you to dig in

and work magick with the element of earth; focus on crystals, stones, minerals, and metals. The sixth card has a tiny mermaid who invites you deeper into the realm of the element of water; embrace your psychic gifts and emotions and see where they lead you. The final cup with the butterfly beckons you to the element of air. Sharpen your intellect, hone your instincts, and pay attention to your intuition. What sort of new knowledge will the element of air blow into your world?

Keywords: Choice. Many wonderful options lie before you—choose one of these cups and their lessons for yourself.

Reversed: Don't be fooled into making a decision for another; they will come to resent you for it. Indecisiveness, fantasy, illusion.

n the foreground are eight silver cups all stacked and balanced neatly in rows and sitting on the shoreline. The young woman is walking away from the cups, leaving them behind, and she is traveling at the water's edge. That she is walking in an in-between place is significant here. She is at the boundary of one realm and the next, namely the earth and sea. An unseen breeze blows/ruffles her cape a bit behind her. A crescent moon shines down from a nighttime sky where eight tiny stars twinkle. There are high cliffs in the distance, but the traveler keeps her eyes on the horizon. She has chosen to abandon things that are no longer necessary or are detrimental. As she travels down the beach, a dolphin spyhops out to see her. The dolphin was considered to be a messenger by the ancient Greeks. He appears in this card as if he is checking on the woman's progress. The young woman is moving on and moving forward. The blossoms in her hair are symbolic; in the language of flowers, pink sweet peas symbolize departure.

Meanings

This card symbolizes the need to move on in your life. The need to move forward might be a physical relocation such as moving for a job or moving to a new home, or this may be an emotional shift. Either way, the message of the Eight of Cups should be honored. If your move is emotional, then set some healthy boundaries. Put the past behind you and go forward with determination to a better, happier, and healthier place. If

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you are physically moving, then go forward and enjoy the positive changes in your life.

Keywords: Moving on with your life, leaving the past behind you, setting healthy boundaries.

Reversed: Abandoning success, risk of making a bad decision.

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

When the Ten of Cups shimmers into a reading, it is a positive omen. This is the card of the happy family and good marriage or stable relationship. This card also symbolizes the bond of friendship, the fellowship of community, or the emotional ties that form in a happy and close coven. Naturally, work and care are required to maintain these good relationships, but a positive and happy outcome will be achieved. Celebrate the loving

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relationships that you have in your life. Friends and family are precious; cherish them.

Keywords: Love, imagination, fulfillment. Joy, good humor, happy family. Good home life, comfort and joy. Friendship, happy coven, being a part of the magickal community.

Reversed: Dissatisfaction, not seeing the magick or the joy within your life. Feeling like an outsider in your family or coven. Being used as a scapegoat.

he Page of Cups is shown here as a young teen on the brink of womanhood. The page is full of optimism and curiosity, and good humor lights up her hazel eyes. Her golden-brown hair is partially gathered back with a seashell headband, while her pale aqua dress and silver starfish earrings show her to be linked to the element of water. Around her throat is a necklace of simple sea glass. The Page of Cups holds a silver cup out before her in both hands. Inside the cup, a blue fish has appeared and is whispering secrets to her. The fish is inviting the page to look within to embrace the element of water and to explore her intuitive, magickal, and psychic talents. Behind the Page of Cups we see bright blue skies and the ocean. Surrounding the page a playful, sparkling wave with a crescent-moon shape is seen. This is another nod towards the feminine powers of the moon and its pull over the ocean tides and its power over us all. The page is not worried about the wave-she welcomes its playful splashing. This court card may also symbolize a student just beginning their studies in the magickal arts. Embrace the

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fun of discovery, and put some joy back into your craft. As with all court cards, the page can represent an actual person. Typically, this

will be a youth with blond or brown hair and blue, light hazel, or green eyes.

The message of the Page of Cups is to explore your magickal and psychic talents. Don't forget that magick is a joyous thing!

Keywords: Imagination. A student beginning magickal or psychic studies, discovering new psychic or magickal talents, embracing hope, and rediscovering the joy of your craft.

Associated Elements: Water and earth. Water is the suit of cups' related natural element, while all four pages are associated with the practical element of earth.

Reversed: Ignoring your intuition and psychic gifts. Refusing to commit to your magickal studies.

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he handsome Knight of Cups is riding leisurely across a green field. A castle can be seen off in the distance, and clouds billow up in the background. Riding a beautiful gray horse, the knight follows a shimmering river towards that castle. The fair knight looks into a silver cup that he holds with a dreamy expression, as if he is seeing something reflected within. The cup held by the knight in this card can be thought of as the Grail, a traditional symbol of the Divine Feminine.

While the Knight of Cups has no sword showing, he still wears silver armor with a beautiful, flowing blue cape. This knight is elegant, not warlike. To further link him to the element of water, there is a wave motif on the trim of his horse's bridle. The two-tailed heraldic mermaids embroidered into the design of his cloak symbolize eloquence, loyalty, and truth. The mermaid is Melusine, an elemental spirit of springs and rivers. The Knight of Cups can be moody and passionate, but he always follows his heart. He is a symbol of courtly love and honor.

This knight could take you along on his quest—how do you think it will go? He may sweep you up into a romantic adventure or be your friend and ally accompanying you on a trip or a spiritual journey.

Meanings

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feelings, which is illustrated by the armor. The Knight of Cups characterizes someone who is faithful and true, who believes in magick, chivalry, and honor. They are the best friend a person could

hope for, and they will probably love once and love deeply. This card often turns up when there is about to be a proposition or tryst. This card also symholizes movement and travel or a kind or chivalrous act. Expect romance, visions of what is to come, magick, and new, creative opportunities.

The challenge of the Knight of Cups is this: will you scry within the surface of the cup to see what will be or look for a vision of your future lover? Flow with the element of water, and seek your mystical answer.

Keywords: A romantic young man. Romance, a proposition or a tryst. A chivalrous act, integration of the Divine Feminine, dreams, a quest, movement and travel.

Associated Elements: Water and fire. Water is the suit of cups' related natural element, while all four of the knights are associated with the energetic element of fire.

Astrological Association: Pisces.

Reversed: An unfaithful man. Vanity, deception. A womanizer, a sycophant.

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he enchanting Queen of Cups sits on a shell and coral throne at the ocean's edge. A playful ocean breeze makes her platinum blond hair flutter back from her tranquil, beautiful face. The gentle waves in the background and gorgeous puffy clouds and blue skies set the tone for her calm and peaceful state of mind. The Queen of Cups is mystical and serene. She wears a pearl-encrusted silver crown with seven points on it, representing the seven seas. Her gown is a deep royal blue with a shell and water design and trimmed in pearls and silver. The queen holds the silver cup in both of her hands and is raising it up to eye level as if she is scrying upon the surface of the liquid within the cup.

A royal, rich necklace of sapphires, silver, and pearls is around the queen's throat. The pearls are linked to the element of water and prophetic dreams, and the silver is a receptive metal. The sapphires are naturally linked to the element of water, and their presence in the queen's silver crown and on her necklace strengthens her psychic awareness and is associated with love and serenity. When the Queen of Cups washes up into your readings, remember that all psychic talents are affected by your emotions. The message of the Queen of Cups is reflection. Calm your emotions, and be loving and gentle. Allow the healing and magick of the element of water to wash over you and bring visions into your world.

Keywords: Serenity, love. A water-sign woman.

Dedication, a loving wife and mother. A natural Witch or talented psychic. Reflection, emotional healing, the gifts of clairvoyance and empathy.

Associated Elements: Water and water. Water is the suit of cups' related natural element, while all four of the queens are also associated with the emotional element of water.

This elemental king wears regal, intricate robes in shades of silver and royal blue, and he is cloaked in majestic purple. A heraldic bright aqua-blue mermaid is embroidered on the chest of his tunic, and silver waves decorate the hem of his robes. The mermaid represents eloquence, loyalty, and truth. The king's crown is made of gleaming silver, with sapphires and a stylized starfish. He also wears a jeweled livery collar, or chain of office, made of silver, blue sapphires, and pearls. The metals and the stones are all linked to the element of water. The silver is receptive. The blue sapphires enhance his psychic talents and his ability to be loving and fair. The lunar pearls exemplify the wonderful gems of the sea. Both of the king's arms rest on the arms of the throne, showing that he is relaxed and in control of his domain. In his right hand he holds a silver cup. In his left hand is a scepter topped with a shell; we also see that this is a married man, as he wears a wedding band on his left hand. The king looks straight ahead as if he is carefully considering both you and your request. The King of Cups is smiling kindly, and his blond hair, moustache, and beard have just a touch of gray in it, showing that he is older and wiser. In the background we can see the ocean and dolphins joyfully leaping out of the water.

Meanings

A mature, wise man who is well versed in the Craft. This card represents an individual who is artistic, intuitive, creative, and

passionate. Physically he has dark blond to light brown hair with a touch of gray, and blue or green eyes. He is a good friend, a loving and attentive husband, and a devoted father. The King of Cups gives good, solid advice when asked. This card can represent a quiet man who keeps his emotions to himself but who can be moody. He is, however, deeply emotional, and he has a tough outer shell to disguise a very soft and loving interior. He often sees what most people would prefer to keep hidden. This card represents an individual who is an excellent mediator, psychically talented, and strong and fair.

The lesson from the King of Cups is that wisdom comes from looking within. Temper your counsel of others with compassion and affection.

Keywords: A water-sign man. A married, mature man well versed in the Craft. A loving husband and father, a good friend, a wise counselor. A creative personality. The gifts of intuition. Wisdom that comes from experience.

Associated Elements: Water and air. Water is the suit of cups' related natural element, while all four of the kings are associated with the wise and thoughtful element of air.

Astrological Association: Scorpio.

Reversed: Difficulty expressing emotions. Dishonesty, a domineering lover, a person taking unfair advantage over another who is less experienced.

Swords

Don't leave home without your sword—your intellect. ALAN MOORE

The suit of swords symbolizes the element of air and all the magickal associations that float out from this element: wisdom, keen intellect, and truth. Swords cards point a clever way down a path to understanding through cutting-edge ideas, knowledge, discernment, and the powers of the mind. This suit illustrates the power of darker emotions, mental activity, intelligence, and prophecy. It develops the original spark of an idea through communication.

The elemental being associated with air is the faerie, so if you look closely at the swords cards, you will see a few winged faeries fluttering in them. Winged creatures such as hawks, falcons, songbirds, and dragonflies are also linked to the element of air and will make their appearance in this suit. There is also plant and flower magick incorporated in these card images. The flowers shown are either aligned to the element of air—such as lavender, mistletoe, and lily of the valley—or have specific messages from the language of flowers that are pertinent to the card.

In the swords suit, you will see intense landscapes. You will find high mountains, windswept places, moonlit boudoirs, midnight forests, and misty castles off in the distance.

The suit of swords is classically associated with people born under an airy zodiac sign: Gemini, Libra, and Aquarius. Physi cally the court cards of the swords suit represent people that have brown hair and gray, green, or hazel eyes. Furthermore, individuals who are drawn to the swords suit tend to be talkative, social, and well read. These intense and intelligent people let their thoughts and dreams

lead the way. the world.	They are the clever planners and shrewd organizers of

Tice of Swords

single silver sword hovers upright in mid-air and is the main focus of the card. Just behind the sword a lone red-tailed hawk flies through the air. Meanings

The Ace of Swords is the most potent and pure form of the mas culine element of air. When the Ace of Swords flies into your life, you are being put on notice that it is time to take action. This is a card of intellect, heroism, victory, justice, achievement, new beginnings, and winning battles. Another of this card's most important lessons is that now you have the chance for a new way of thinking. Cut through the fantasy and embrace what is. The truth hurts, but sometimes it can also heal and make room for a new, improved reality. Success is attainable; victory is near; go grab ahold of it with both hands!

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Keywords: Success, truth, awareness, victory. Determination. Take action now. A clear perception leads to spirit and a closer connection to deity. The element of air.

Reversed: Illusion, confusion, cruelty, injustice. Get a grip on yourself, and work on finding balance.

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Two of Swords

Also, the herb lavender is associated with the element of air and is very protective when grown in a Witch's garden. TWO faeries hover above the lavender, one on either side of the woman. Interestingly, the faeries face the water . . . perhaps they are helping to watch her back.

Meanings

When this card turns up in a reading, it is a warning that you have blocked off your heart and emotions and are holding in your feelings. You are literally refusing to see what is right in

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front of you. Your heart says one thing, while logic says another. The water in this card represents your emotions and the repression of them. Just as the woman has turned her back on her feelings, you need to be

aware that you are blocked and have closed yourself off. You may think you have balance, but there is no resolution. Take a careful look at both sides of the situation. Consider your options: boundaries are a positive thing, but do not shut yourself off from others. Be like the water and the swords in this card—stay calm and reflect like the water while you work through this, and be balanced like the swords as you work for equilibrium and understanding.

Keywords: The heart and mind are not in agreement. Putting up unhealthy boundaries, holding in your true feelings, working for balance of heart and mind, considering your options.

Reversed: Being forced to face your suppressed emotions. Conflict, injustice, obstinacy.

When the Three of Swords turns up in a reading, it is like a sucker punch to the stomach. It hurts. This card, more than any other, illustrates the pain and loss that the querent is experiencing at this time. What you need to understand is that you will have to take the pain into your heart, accept it, shed your tears, and then move beyond it. Once you have accepted the pain and experienced the grief, then—and only then—can you move forward. This card may also stand for a delay to a project and plans or the painful karmic repercussions that are experienced when a manipulative spell backfires on the caster.

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Keywords: Delay, personal betrayal, loss. A time of drama and tears. Sadness, conflict. A spell that has backfired.

Reversed: Destruction, strife. The healing process is blocked. Until you work through your grief, you will not be able to move on.

This card symbolizes that you need to allow yourself time to recover from an illness. It may also represent a need to step away from group magick for a

bit. You may need to practice solitarily for a time. You will find the solutions to your magickal problems quietly and on your own.

Keywords: Taking some downtime for yourself. Resting and allowing yourself to fully recover from an illness. Recouping lost energy. Working magick as a solitary for a while, and finding your focus.

Reversed: Feeling that you have been banished from a group. Rejection, exhaustion.

Pearly white clouds are illuminated, and just beneath the gathered points of the five swords is a gorgeous iridescent dragonfly, a symbol for the element of air, the Faery realm, and illusion. Five faeries fly merrily around the swords, uncaring of their sharp edges and any possible danger. But what do you suppose is the most dangerous aspect of this card, the sharp edges of the swords or the possible trickery of the fae? This card shows that your pride was hurt, but it's not fatal; do not overreact. You may feel embarrassed at the moment, but most of what you are so humiliated about is an illusion. The dragonfly represents a need to gain a new perspective and to make a change. The faeries encourage you to learn to laugh at yourself a bit, to see through others' trickery, and to keep moving forward.


Meanings

Reversed: Short-term improvement. Challenges to your progress.

Travel delays or complications.

Come up with a new solution to the same old problems. Think outside the box and you will experience a victory and a breakthough.

Keywords: New schemes, new solutions. Thinking outside the box. Relying on your street smarts. Partial victory, evasion, cunning, foresight.

Reversed: Allowing fear to hold you back. Not seizing opportunities. Timid behavior.

However, if the individual would stop overreacting and feeling sorry for themselves and would pull off that emotional blinder, they would see a way out. Things are not as bad as they may appear. Happiness is possible, the sun is breaking through, and new opportunities can emerge. This card may also represent a Witch who is fearful

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of ritual or of their own initiation. Think of the classic challenge given to most blindfolded initiates: "It is better to rush upon this blade than to enter the circle with fear in your heart. How do you enter?" They have to answer without fear or they are denied entrance into the coven. What can you learn from this card? Look again at the description and symbolism, and find your answers. Fear has no place in the Craft.

Keywords: Restriction, feeling trapped. Overreacting to the situation. Things are not as bad as they seem; you can work your way out of this. Fear of initiation or ritual.

Reversed: Feeling completely helpless, overwhelmed. Mild situational depression. Leaving a coven out of fear of the unknown.

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Nine of Swords

The yellow primrose flowers embroidered on the bed linens symbolize sorrow. The woman may be reaching up towards the handle of the bottom sword . . . perhaps she is finally ready to defend herself, to break free and to stop the drama. Or maybe she needs to feel sorry for herself just a bit longer.

Meanings

This is the "drama queen" card. When it turns up in a reading, it symbolizes a person who is always having a crisis or causing drama in coven dynamics or social situations. They may be an emotional or psychic vampire, or they themselves could be the willing victim of such an attack. As this is a nine of the suit, it also symbolizes that you are near the end of the problem. Things have reached their peak and should begin to settle down—as long as you do not give way to dramatics. Decide to pick up the sword, to be proactive, and to defend yourself and your personal energies. Furthermore, this card can represent the karmic repercussions of poor judgment or backlash from a manipulative magickal act. I think of this card as a perfect

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illustration of baneful magick that has returned to its sender times three. Keywords: "Drama queen" card. Psychic or emotional vampire or victim. Baneful magick returned to its sender times three.

Reversed: Suspicion, fear, anxiety. Morbid fantasy, cruel behavior. Uninvited, unrepentant psychic vampire.

A Ione plant of purple blooming monkshood grows near the body. In the language of flowers monkshood warns that a deadly foe is near. Clearly this man did not pay attention to the poisonous herb's warning.

Meanings

When the Ten of Swords rolls into a reading, you have to ask yourself, "Why did you not listen to your own instincts?" This card is a vivid illustration of being stabbed in the back. This shows betrayal from a loved one, friend, or coven member. This is what happens when you ignore your inner voice and gut hunches that something is wrong. By ignoring the warning signs and not paying heed to your own instincts that trouble was brewing, you have paid the price. This card can also symbolize being involved with a toxic group of people, such as in

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a job environment or even in a coven where you are not cherished but instead made to feel like an outsider. If your instincts are warning you that you don't belong, then you need to be wise, like the owl, and fly away from the group and all of their negativity.

Keywords: A coven where you do not feel accepted or cherished. A toxic group of people. Betrayal, being stabbed in the back, ignoring your instincts.

Reversed: Physical harm from another. A negative or immoral group of people. Unfairly becoming the scapegoat for a family or coven and all of its problems.

Off in the far distance, at the horizon, mountains can be seen. In this court card the element of air is paired with the intensity and quick, moody reactions of a young man. It is anybody's guess as to whether he will rein in his temper and react appropriately.

Meanings

When this card lands in a reading, it means that you need to think quickly and act decisively but keep your temper in check. You need to remain vigilant and to be on guard for trouble or conflict, but you should use your wit and not brute force. You do have the ability to quickly put an end to nonsense and petty arguments with either quick actions or a few wellchosen words. This card may physically represent an intense, impulsive, and active young person with brown hair and green or hazel eyes. The hawk symbolizes messages, and when it

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appears in your life it is always a sign from deity to pay attention to what is going on around you.

The message of the Page of Swords is that caution, cleverness, and tact are needed at this time. Try for tact before you take a swipe at your opponent.

Keywords: Vigilance, caution. Standing on guard for trouble or conflict. Putting an end to petty conflicts with a few well-chosen words. An intense and intelligent young man.

Associated Elements: Air and earth. Air is the suit of swords' related natural element, while all four of the pages are associated with the practical element of earth.

Reversed: Tension, rash actions. Using physical force when it is unnecessary.

This deck is based on the Rider-Waite-Smith system, which aligns the wands suit with fire and the swords suit with air. The suit of wands symbolizes the element of fire and all the magickal associations that radiate from this element. Wands are all about enthusiasm, confidence, and ambition. In the Witches Tarot the wand itself is a blooming branch of hawthorn adorned with red ribbons. The hawthorn tree is a magickal tree that is associated with the element of fire, which is why I chose it for this suit. Hawthorn blossoms are used in protection and fertility spells.

The hawthorn, sometimes referred to as "thorn," is part of the magickal trinity of faerie trees. The oak, ash, and thorn (or hawthorn) make up that triad. In the language of flowers the fragrant hawthorn blossom symbolizes hope. Wands cards illuminate a path to understanding through physical action, movement, and optimism. They illustrate the power of adventure, passion, and excitement. The wands suit explores the desire to create. Finally, this suit often is associated with career and business. The suit of wands corresponds to people born under a fiery zodiac sign: Aries, Leo, and Sagittarius. Physically the court cards of the wands suit represent people who have very fair complexions, with either pale blond or red hair and light blue or green eyes.



The Page of Pentacles represents a person who is studious and quiet. They are generous, kind, and a "fixer." This page denotes not only a faithful friend but one who will work hard to achieve their goals. With focus and practical hard work, they will be very successful. This card can also symbolize a student of the magickal arts who is enthusiastic, fascinated, and completely absorbed with their studies, or a student who feels the call to

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explore Faery magick. Now is the time to focus on your spirituality. Take a look at how your spellwork manifests on the physical plane. If

you want your magickal practice to flourish, then you must allow it time to blossom and grow.

The message of the Page of Pentacles is this: open your eyes, look to nature, and patiently study her ways to understand the lessons of earth magick that await you there.

Keywords: A time of study. Love of nature. Patience, kindness, generosity. Being drawn to the Faery realm. Enthusiasm, success. Take the time to focus on your spirituality.

Associated Elements: Earth and earth. Earth is the suit of pentacles' related natural element, while all four of the pages are also associated with the practical element of earth.

Reversed: Having a disconnect to your magick. Feeling smothered or trapped in the mundane world. Boredom, lack of focus.

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he Knight of Pentacles is patiently sitting still while mounted on a black horse. The knight's visor is up, and he is looking carefully at the surrounding countryside. He seems friendly, but he is still just a little mysterious. The golden pentacle he carries close to his chest, like a shield, symbolizes the knight's steadfast faithfulness. The knight's armor is polished to a gleam, and he wears a grass-green tunic and a cloak. Green is the color of nature, Faery, fertility, and Witchcraft. The trim, bridle, and reins on the knight's horse all bear a green leaf motif, another visual link to the earth element.

The Knight of Pentacles is a representative of the Goddess, as is the Green Knight of myth and legend. And just like that Green Knight, the Knight of Pentacles does not actively seek out battles, but he is ready for them all the same. Note the heraldic stag on his horse's emerald parade cloak. In heraldry the stag symbolizes harmony, peace, and that the knight will not fight unless he is provoked, which makes it a perfect symbol for our Knight of Pentacles. In the background we see a yellow sky at dawn, golden and green fields, and a stream. A magnificent stag appears silhouetted against the landscape. The stag represents the element of earth and the qualities that encompass the Knight of Pentacles, such as pride, poise, and integrity.

Meanings

When the Knight of Pentacles arrives in a reading, expect a test of some kind. This will not be a drama-filled scenario but a quiet test of your honor and personal beliefs. Remember that the Green Knight of legend was a "tester" of other knights.

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While he was a friendly character, he was also mysterious. In a reading, the Knight of Pentacles also represents a down-toearth young man with a dark complexion and eyes. He is kind, compassionate, dependable, faithful, hard working, and practical. This card may also indicate that enrollment in a university, trade, or technical school is in the future. Like all of the other knight cards, the Knight of Pentacles is also a movement card, but the movement here is more methodical. This knight takes his time, actively observes, and then thoughtfully moves forward to deal with any challenges.

The challenge of the Knight of Pentacles is that active observation and methodical movement is necessary. Deal with any challenges in this way, and you will obtain a quiet victory.

Keywords: A down-to-earth, practical young man. Hard work, active observation, stamina, patience, responsibility. Methodically dealing with life's challenges.

Associated Elements: Earth and fire. Earth is the suit of pentacles' related natural element, while all four of the knights are associated with the energetic element of fire.

Astrological Association: Virgo.

Reversed: There are obstacles in your path—possibly a crossed condition. It is time to take a careful look and then methodically start to work through the situations. It will take time.

Queen of Pentacles

he beautiful and exotic Queen of Pentacles sits on her floral throne, a bower of climbing red roses growing above her. She has dark eyes, and green ribbons are worked into the braids of her raven-colored hair. Her gown is in shades of earthy green. She wears a crown made of golden leaves and set with square-cut emeralds. On the queen's forehead, she wears a red bindi. This is a symbol of the mystical third eye and of wisdom. In particular, the red color of the gems in her bindi design represent honor, love, and prosperity. As befits royalty, around her throat is a heavy, rich necklace of square-cut emeralds. The emerald is an enchanting stone that gifts its wearer with bliss and loyalty. The queen holds a golden pentacle in her right hand, and in the crook of her left arm she holds a bouquet of white and green tulips, honeysuckle, and golden wheat, bound together with pale green ribbons. Behind the queen's throne is a beautiful landscape and blue skies, while an adorable brown dog sits at her feet. The flowers the queen holds are all linked to the element of earth. Green tulips symbolize prosperity and luck in love; honeysuckle, wealth and devoted affection; and the wheat, abundance and riches. The red roses in the bower around the queen signify beauty and love. The dog corresponds to the element of earth and is a sign of loyalty and companionship.

Meanings

When the Queen of Pentacles appears in a reading, look for the ultimate earth mama. This card represents a mature woman who may have dark hair and eyes. She is practical and has a deep love of nature and a spiritual connection to the earth. While this queen is sensual, gorgeous, and loves beautiful things, she will work hard to get and maintain the things she cherishes. Gardening, cooking, or redecorating, she is always creating or tending to something or someone. This queen is happiest when she is nurturing others. She is a devoted wife and mother, an amusing friend, a generous hostess, and a passionate lover all rolled into one. The Queen of Pentacles is often linked to the Empress card. If they should both turn up in a reading, motherhood is the prime focus. The Queen of Pentacles is the definitive nurturer card. This card speaks of welcoming, cozy homes; happy families; beloved pets; loyal friends; fun; and affection.

The message of the Queen of Pentacles is to embrace your love of the beautiful things in this world. Create a beautiful and magickal atmosphere for yourself and your loved ones.

Keywords: An earth-sign woman. A homemaker in the best sense of the word. Emotional fulfillment. Generous hostess, loyal friend, nature lover, earth mama, devoted wife and partner. Hearth and home. Motherhood.

Associated Elements: Earth and water. Earth is the suit of pentacles' related natural element, while all four of the queens are associated with the emotional element of water.

Astrological Association: Capricorn.

Reversed: Obsession with possessions and material wealth. Holding appearance and social status in too high of a regard. A false friend. Suspicion, jealousy, unfaithfulness.

King of Pentacles

he handsome King of Pentacles is seated in an outdoor stone courtyard and leans back comfortably against royal purple cushions in his golden throne. He has black hair, a neat beard and moustache, and dark brown eyes, and he wears a leafy gold crown set with emeralds. The King of Pentacles holds in his left hand a large golden pentacle that he is gazing down upon. His right arm rests upon the arm of his throne, and he holds a golden scepter. The King of Pentacles wears a simple livery collar, or chain of office, of gold with emeralds. The emerald is an inspiring stone that grants patience. We see chain mail underneath this king's royal robes, which shows us that while he is a ruler, he still has the skills needed to defend his land and his people. A heraldic white stag, often called a hart, appears on the chest of the king's robe. In heraldry a white hart is a symbol of royalty. Behind the King of Pentacles, in the distance, we see a turreted castle. When castles appear in tarot cards, they show us that the quest for knowledge and advancement is complete, which is fitting for the final card in the Minor Arcana. Around the king grows a grapevine heavy with ripe purple grapes. The grapevine and grapes symbolize prosperity, plenty, and domestic happiness.

Meanings

When the King of Pentacles makes an appearance in a reading, know that with hard work and determination, success is on its way. The King of Pentacles represents a man with dark hair and deep brown eyes. He is easygoing, responsible, and, most importantly, a realistic man. An earth-sign man, he is

strong, steady, and mature, and enjoys the simple pleasures in life. He is a generous and supportive personality and a loving, loyal spouse. He is a protective father who honestly enjoys his children. This man is successful, practical, and content with his life. He is a skilled craftsman and one who enjoys gardening, landscaping, farming, or woodworking. He is happiest when he is working with the soil or making something with his hands. He has worked hard and has earned his comfort and success.

The lesson of the King of Pentacles is that your efforts have manifested into success. Prosperity will be drawn to you.

Keywords: An earth-sign man. Determination, hard work, wealth, security, success, responsibility. A skilled craftsman. Protector of the family. A mature individual who is a rock to lean on in tough situations.

Associated Elements: Earth and air. Earth is the suit of pentacles' related natural element, while all four of the kings are associated with the wise and thoughtful element of air.

Astrological Association: Taurus.

Reversed: A person who is brooding, stubborn, and a little controlling. Materialism. Losing sight of what is truly important.

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Tarot Spreads

What could be more convincing, moreover, than the gesture of laying one's cards faceup on the table?

JACQUES LACAN

There are many varieties of tarot card spreads, which allows for some personalization and freedom while doing your readings. There are a few classic spreads, such as the seven-card spread called the Horseshoe and the three-card reading. What you need to remember is this: the pattern that the cards are laid out in provides the structure for any reading.

However, trust your instincts. If, for example, the old Celtic Cross Spread does not resonate with you personally, then don't use it. I have created a few new witchy tarot spreads for this deck. I thought, when all was said and done, it would be best to include something new and fresh for the Witches Tarot. These readings include the Triple Goddess Spread, the Four Elements Spread, and the Wheel of the Year Spread. Each of these new readings includes a spell verse that helps fine-tune the divination.

One-Card Reading

Simplicity is the ultimate sophistication.

LEONARDO DA VINCI

This card reading is short, simple, and to the point. It gives you an instant answer. Shuffle the deck, and then fan the cards out

facedown across the table. Say out loud, "What is it that I most need to know?" Now choose one card. You may want to hold your hand out over the cards and see which one "feels" right to you, or choose one at random. Flip the card, and there is your answer.

Other good questions for a one-card reading include:

- What is my personal lesson for the day?
- Is there a message for me from my guides or from the God and Goddess today?
- What do I need to know before I cast this spell?
- How will my spellwork manifest?

Finally, a simple, single card reading is a nice way to get a handle on whatever lessons your day may hold. Shuffle the deck, ask the gods to guide your hand and help you comprehend their message, and pull out one card. This is also fun to do at a coven gathering. Simply have each coven member pull one card and pass the deck clockwise around the circle. Discuss the meanings and talk about the cards with your coven members.

Three-Card Reading

Therefore, when the mind knows itselfand loves itself, there remains a trinity—that is the mind, love, and knowledge.

PETER LOMBARD

Three-card readings are fun. There are many variations on how you may interpret a trinity of cards. One of the most common three-card spreads is as follows:

1) Past 2)

Present

3) Future

Or, when divining the answer to a problem or problematic situation, you can use this interpretation, where the three-card positions are defined as:

- 1) What is unknown about the current problem
- 2) What is blocking you
- 3) How to proceed for best results

To add some witchy flair to a three-card reading, shuffle the cards carefully, and, while you do, say the first line of the spell:

By all the power of the magick of three...

Deal out the three cards facedown, and then say:

These cards will now reveal their wisdom to me.

Now turn the cards over and read them.

Seven-Card Horseshoe Spread

The success of a reading depends not on the facts but on its effect on the querent, its power to move and change a person in a beneficial way.

MARY K. GREER

Without a doubt, this is my favorite style of tarot reading. What is nice about this reading is that you can layer another set of cards over the first. This gives you a deeper meaning and provides more

insight into a reading. Shuffle the cards well and ask your question. Deal out seven cards from left to right to create a horseshoe. Now take a careful look at the cards that appear in your reading.

- The first card of the reading, starting from the left, will signify the past and what brought you to this point.
- The second card is the present, meaning what is happening right now.
- The third card shows the future—what is yet to be.
- The fourth card represents your best course of action, or the best way for you to proceed.
- The fifth card represents the other people in the situation who are they, what motivates them, and how they affect your life.
- The sixth card signifies your obstacles and your fears.
- The seventh and final card is the outcome card.

The Significator Card Reading

A man may not always be what he appears to be, but what he appears to be is always a significant part of what he is.

WILLARD GAYLIN

A significator card is a card used as a prop, or a tool, to focus upon in a tarot reading. The card typically represents the querent (the questioner or client). The significator card may also be used to

illustrate the circumstances about which the guidance is being sought, such as the High Priestess card for a Witch inquiring about how to best deal with issues in her coven, or the High Priest for a gentleman who is wondering what his correct magickal path would be or where to focus his studies. Use your imagination. What other Major Arcana cards would you use as a focal point for various situations?

When a significator card is used in a reading, it is removed from the deck and placed faceup in the center of the table so it is easily seen and focused upon. The rest of the cards are shuffled and then dealt out around the significator card for various styles of readings.

If a significator card is used to represent the querent, then a court card is typically chosen on the basis of which card looks most physically like the client. Take a look at the following court card significator classifications.

Physical Appearance for Significator Cards

The suit of cups symbolizes a person with dark blond or pale blond hair and blue or green eyes.

The suit of wands represents individuals with fair complexions, blond or red hair, and pale blue or gray eyes.

The suit of swords illustrates a person with brown hair and green, blue, or hazel eyes.

The suit of pentacles corresponds to people with dark hair, dark brown eyes, and deeper complexions.

The problem with this classification is that not every hair color and skin tone is represented, so think of the above suggestions more as guidelines than actual rules.

Court Cards as Significator Cards: Astrological and Elemental Personalities

All human beings are interconnected, one with all other elements in creation.

HENRY REED

You can use the different characters within the court cards to finetune your significator card even more: use pages for children, knights for young adults, and queens and kings for middle age and older. Furthermore, you can link the significator card to the querent's astrological sign, or do as I do and use their elemental personality traits to match those up with the most complementary court card.

I find that it works like a charm!

Astrological Signs for Significators

Cups: Cancer, Scorpio, and Pisces (Water)

Wands: Aries, Leo, and Sagittarius (Fire)

Swords: Gemini, Libra, and Aquarius (Air)

Pentacles: Taurus, Virgo, and Capricorn (Earth)

Elemental Personality Traits for Significators

Mystical, empathic, and emotional? Water-Cups

Clever, cerebral, and witty? Air—Swords

Fiery, passionate, and outgoing? Fire—Wands

Earthy, practical, and easygoing? Earth—Pentacles

Finally, when choosing a significator card, I tend to use the page cards for young people, the queens for women, and the kings or knights for men. I let my instinct and intuition guide my hand and my choice. For example, if I were doing a reading for a woman, I would look carefully at the person I was doing the reading for and then choose whichever one of the four queen cards were most like her personality.

The Triple Goddess Spread

Listen to the words of the great Mother . . . DOREEN VALIENTE

TAROT-

SPREADS

I came up with the idea for this Triple Goddess reading as Mark, the artist, was working his way through the illustrations of the Major Arcana. I had been explaining the concept of the Triple Goddess to him as he finished the High Priestess card. I told him that the High Priestess card, in fact, represented the Maiden, while the Empress card was the Mother aspect of the Goddess. He commented with a chuckle that that must be why I had insisted on her being obviously pregnant in the illustration. As I explained how the third aspect was the Crone Goddess, we ended our conversation, since I had a different book to finish and he had a lot of tarot illustrations to work on.

I was going over my notes on the script that had been written a year previously, and I kept being drawn to the illustration guidelines I had written for the Moon card. It just didn't seem right. It was very classic, with the Crone's face in the waning moon, but it didn't really inspire me. As I love classic tarot images, I was unsure of what to do, so I decided to let the idea brew for a while. I had a few days before Mark would tackle that particular card anyway, so I got ready to run some errands instead.

I tossed on a T-shirt, which happened to have the Triple Goddess illustrated on it; I caught my reflection in the mirror, and then it hit me: as a Witches' deck, there was no better reason than to make the Triple Goddess a vital part of the deck. The Moon card was my opportunity for a better interpretation of the Crone.

I had one deity in mind: one of my favorites, Hecate. I called Mark back and then we brainstormed. I made some changes to my script for that card and sent him some reference images. He loved the idea of Hecate and that we would push that particular card beyond what was average or expected—just like Hecate herself.

I felt the Goddess was looking over my shoulder that day, and with images swirling in my mind of what I imagined the Crone's card to become, I sat down at my desk and wrote in a spiral notebook the Triple Goddess reading. Here is the layout.

This reading uses three significator cards: the High Priestess for the Maiden, the Empress for the Mother, and the Moon for the Crone. Place these three cards in a row and then shuffle the remaining cards carefully. Ask the Triple Goddess to share her wisdom with you. Repeat this charm:

Maiden, Mother, and Crone, now guide my hand and heart. Show me your wisdom today by this Witch's art.

With the power of three times three,

As I will it, so shall it be.

Now deal three cards under each aspect of the Goddess. You will have nine cards in all.

- The Maiden shows you the possibilities—your hopes and dreams and what yet may be.
- The Mother shows you how your projects and goals have come to fruition and what is happening right now.
- The Crone shows you the outcome and your karma— the things that are unseen and what you may be unaware of or afraid to face

The Four Elements Spread

Earth and water, air and fire, wand, pentacle, and sword...

DOREEN VALIENTE

This spread works with four significator cards: all of the aces. As the aces classically symbolize the unity and perfection of each of the four natural elements, choosing the aces as focal points for this spread made perfect sense to me.

To begin, remove all of the aces from the deck. Arrange them with the Ace of Pentacles (earth) on the top, the Ace of Swords (air) to the right, the Ace of Wands (fire) at the bottom, and the Ace of Cups (water) to the left.

Take a moment to ground and center and contemplate the power of each of the elements and what they bring into your life. Ask the elements to help guide you along your path. Repeat this charm:

Elements of earth, air, fire, and water,

Assist me now, and lend me your great power.

Let your magickal energies swirl quickly around,

Allowing strength, wisdom, courage, and love to be found.

May the messages in these cards show me the way So
I can walk my path with wisdom every day.

Now shuffle the remaining cards and ask what lessons you need to learn from each of the elements. Deal one new card from the deck next to each of the element cards.

- The earth (pentacles) card shows you what you need to be grounded, strong, and prosperous.
- The air (swords) card illustrates what you need for knowledge and clear communication.

- The fire (wands) card announces what is required for success, courage, and passion.
- The water (cups) card whispers what is needed to bring forth loving emotions and healing.

Magickal Variations: If you like, you can add the Magician card to the center of the circle of aces. Visually this will increase the focus and the power of the spread. Remember, the Magician has all four of the Minor Arcana symbols upon his altar. This Major Arcana card is a perfect portrayal of an individual who works harmoniously with the powers of the four elements and wisely with nature.

Should you decide to add the archetypal imagery of the Magician to the four elements spread, insert these lines at the end of the previous charm as a tagline:

As above, now so below,

Around the Magician the answers will flow.

The Wheel of the Year Spread

May you be blessed with peace and safety in all four seasons.

CHINESE PROVERB

For this spread you will pull the Wheel of the Year card from the deck. Use this as the significator, and place it in the center. Shuffle the remaining tarot cards and then, in a clockwise pattern, deal out eight cards around the central significator card.

Take a moment to ground and center and to contemplate the power and mysteries of each of the eight sabbats. To help you focus and interpret the card spread, repeat this charm:

TAROT SPREADS

The Wheel of the Year Spread has wisdom true to share,
Enlighten me as I seek to know and to dare.
Eight cards, one for each of the Witches' holy days of the year,
Show me the correct way to travel so my path may be clear.

Of the eight cards dealt around the significator card, their order is up to you. However, I typically make the top card represent the next sabbat to occur in the year. In other words, if you are doing this spread in late July, then the next sabbat is Lughnasadh, so Lughnasadh would be the first card at the top of the circle. Going clockwise to its right would be the card for the Autumn Equinox, then continuing around clockwise, the next card would represent the lessons for Samhain, Yule, Imbolc, the Vernal Equinox,

Beltane, and Midsummer.

Magick with the Witches Tarot Deck

There is magic, but you have to be the magician. You have to make the magic happen.

SIDNEY SHELDON

I heartily encourage you to employ the Witches Tarot cards in your spellwork. Tarot cards make wonderful tools for spellcasting, as they can become neat and clever visual guides. Not only does this practice give you something magickal and attractive to focus on, it will help you to build a relationship with the cards themselves. The cards in the Witches Tarot deck make great props in ritual, and—best of all—you have seventy-eight of them with which to work your witchery!

Recently I taught a class on the four elements and personal power. I had set up a pretty elemental altar for the students to see when they arrived. There were fresh flowers from my garden scattered across the altar, and each corner of the table was dedicated to one of the four elements. There were crystals for earth, shells for water, feathers for air, and a red, cinnamonscented candle for fire. My students were surprised to see that I had included the ace of each tarot suit at the appropriate point of the altar as well. I explained the symbolism and then stood there grinning as I watched the wheels in their brains start to turn ...As the four aces personify the basic elemental quality of their suit, they actually make wonderful elemental representations during magick. Try it out sometime. Be creative—see what you can conjure up!

You may decide to add candles or other accessories to these tarot spells. I kept these spells basic, with plenty of room for personalization. As I have said many, many times, personalizing the spells—adding a bit of yourself into the ritual—makes your witchery unique and thereby more powerful.

Court Cards for Personal Magick and Meditation

For something different, consider using your Witches Tarot cards as a focal point in meditation and personal magick—for example, if you were beginning a new project and needed to be inspired or if you needed help meeting a looming deadline. If you could really could use a burst of enthusiasm and energy for that project, then pages are perfect to work with.

Calling on the Pages for Inspiration and Enthusiasm

To begin, place the appropriate page at a each quarter: pentacles in the north, swords in the east, wands in the south, and cups in the west. You may cast a circle or just roll with it; either way, circle or no, will work out just fine. Then stand in the center of the cards and say:

May the pages' enthusiasm surround me today,

May I be blessed with their sense ofadventure, come what may.

By the four suits ofpentacles, swords, wands, and cups, May
this magick circle surround and boost me up!

Now take a seat; stay in the circle and meditate. If you like, you can turn and face each card, pick them up, and look at them closely. Study each of the pages, and see what sort of inspiration comes your way. When you have worked your way around and contemplated all four of the pages, ground and center yourself, and then close the spell

with the following lines: For the good of all, with harm to none, By tarot's magick, this spell is done!

If you did cast a circle, open it now. Return the cards to your deck, and get to work on that project! You will find the enthusiasm of the four pages to be most inspiring. (I had a hard time keeping up with them as I finished this book!)

Other Spellcasting Options with Court Cards

Consider working with the four kings for powerful and wise magick—when you could use a little extra wisdom or reaffirm your integrity. The four queens are wonderful for emotional, creative, and compassionate varieties of magick. Likewise, the four knights are impressive when it comes to dealing with challenges, change, and movement. All you need to do is follow the basic spell outline.

Here are the spell verses for working with the four kings, queens, and knights. To begin, place the appropriate court card at a each quarter: pentacles in the north, swords in the east, wands in the south, and cups in the west. You may cast a circle or not; either way, circle or no, will work out just fine. Then stand in the center of the four cards and repeat the appropriate verse.

Kings' Verse

The authority of the four kings will inspire me today,

May I be blessed with wisdom and integrity throughout my day.

By the four suits ofpentacles, swords, wands, and cups,

May this magick circle around and lift me up!

Queens 'Verse

May the queens' loving inspiration surround me today,

May I be blessed with their strength and compassion come what may.

By the four suits ofpentacles, swords, wands, and cups,

May this magick circle surround and lift me up!

Knights 'Verse

The knights' action and courage will move me forward today,

I'll be victorious with challenges that come my way.

By the four suits ofpentacles, swords, wands, and cups,

May this magick circle surround and boost me up!

After the chosen verse is spoken, take a seat. Stay in the circle and meditate. If you like, you can turn and face each card, pick it up, and look at it more closely. Study each of the queens or knights in turn and see what sort of inspiration comes your way. When you have worked your way around and contemplated all four of the cards, ground and center yourself. Then close the spell with the following lines:

For the good of all, with harm to none, By tarot's magick, this spell is done!

If you did cast a circle, open it now. Return the cards to your deck.

Tarot and Witchery

In these spells, I list the tarot cards along with their keywords so you can see how they all link together and why they were chosen for the specific spell. I also have suggested a coordinating candle color, crystal, and herb; just a small sprig of the herb will do. Add these

accoutrements to any tarot spells when you'd like to give your witchery a bit more oomph!

Basic Directions

For all of the following tarot spells, lay out the cards in the order they are listed. If you choose, you may add the suggested colored candle, crystal, or herb. Arrange the cards, light the candle, and repeat the spell verse.

Leave the cards, crystal, and herb in place for as long as the candle burns. (Be sure to keep an eye on that spell candle!) Then, when the candle is spent, return the cards to the deck and pocket the crystal. If you added a sprig of herb to the spell, you may keep that with you or "return it neatly to nature. Blessed be.

Tarot Spell

to Enhance Magickal or Tarot Studies

The Magician: As above, so below. Skill, determination, connection, confidence. Strength of will. Working magick with the four elements and the elemental spirits. The Hermetic Principle of Correspondence. Elemental magick and personal power.

Minor Tlrcana Nurnber and Court Card Meanings

When One made love to Zero,
Spheres embraced their arches and
prime numbers caught their breath.

RAYMOND OUENEAU

Ace: Basic elemental quality. Represents the beginning of things, new ideas, projects, or birth.

Two: The relationship between two people or principles. Reflection, harmony, and balance.

Three: Full expression of the element. Love, expectancy. The concept of creation, divinity, and fate.

Four: Stability, firm foundations, structure, and order.

The Four of Wands and Four of Swords are calming and steadying, while the Four of Cups and Four of Pentacles show stagnation and restriction.

Five: Loss, conflict, regret, and problems. Crisis, creating challenges, arguments, opportunity to learn something new.

Six: Balance, harmony, love, benevolence, past actions, communication, reunion, accomplishment.

Seven: Skill, victory, luck, daring, impatience, wisdom, mystery. Magickal gifts associated with each suit.

Eight: Enthusiasm, inspiration, regeneration, success, justice, reevaluation, redirection. Development or growth in future.

Nine: Limits, boundaries, melancholy. Almost finished. Achieving results and learning from previous experience. Three times three. Emotionally satisfied, contented.

Ten: New stage of development. Completion, heritage, karma. The need to go beyond limits.

Page: Children and teens, students, messengers. Undeveloped potential, risk taking, curiosity, hopefulness, exploration, study of practical matters.

Knight: Adventure, movement, progress, action, responsibility to others.

Queen: Mothering, nurturing, creativity, caring, compassion, kindness, inspiration. Deep magickal meaning of the suit.

King: Father figure, teacher, mentor, leader. Authority, responsibility, power, success. Policy, pride, stubbornness, arrogance.

S(J111bols in Tarot Cards

Nature is a temple in which living columns sometimes emit confused words. Man approaches it through forests of symbols, which observe him with familiar glances.

CHARLES BAUDELAIRE

Armor and Chain Mail: A form of defense, it symbolizes protection and strength. It is seen in the cards the Emperor, Chariot, Death, Knight of Cups, Knight of Swords, Knight of Wands, King of Swords, Six of Wands, Knight of Pentacles, and King of Pentacles.

Bench: The bench illustrates neutrality and that it is time to have a seat and mull things over. Seen in the cards the High Priest, Justice, and IWo of Swords.

Birds: Higher thoughts and spiritual messages. Seen in the cards the Hanged Man, the Star, the World, Queen of Cups, Ten of Swords, Queen of Swords, and Eight of Pentacles.

Blindfolds: There are two possible definitions to blindfolds in the Witches Tarot. One, seen in the Eight of Swords, shows that the woman feels trapped—like a hostage. Her blindfold causes disorientation and keeps her unaware of her surroundings. Then we have the opposite end of the spectrum: the of Swords. This blindfold prevents distraction and helps her to look within. Her other senses are heightened now; what can she learn from them?

Butterfly: A classic symbol of transformation and beauty. Seen in the Seven of Cups and Ace of Wands.

Castle: Castles are often seen in the background of the cards. They represent the reward that waits for you after your quest for knowledge and advancement is completed. Seen in the Death card, Four of Swords, Eight of Swords, Ace of Wands, Four of Wands, Ten of Wands, Seven of Cups, Knight of Cups, and King of Pentacles.

Cat: The feline is associated with the element of fire and symbolizes perception, psychic powers, mystery, and Witchcraft. Domestic cats, in all their wondrous varieties, are the classic Witch's familiar. Cats grace us with their presence in the following cards: the High Priestess, Seven of Cups, of Wands, Four of Wands, Page of Wands, Queen of Wands, and Three of Pentacles.

Children: Children in tarot cards typically represent the following emotions: adventure, youth, energy, enthusiasm, the joy of life, legacy, and tradition.

Children are seen in the cards the Fool, the Emperor, Death, the Sun, Four of Cups, Six of Cups, Ten of Cups, Six of Pentacles, and Ten of Pentacles.

Cliffs: Symbolize being at the edge of danger and the unknown. Seen in the cards the Fool, the Hermit, the Tower, Karma, Eight of Cups, and Seven of Wands.

Crow and Raven: Mystery, magick, and cleverness. The animal ally of the seer. The raven/crow graces the following cards: the Hanged Man and the Eight of Pentacles.

Deer: The deer is associated with the element of earth.

Traditionally the stag symbolized pride, poise, and integrity. A stag is seen in the World and Nine of Pentacles cards, while the white hind appears in the Page of Pentacles. The white hind is a symbol of magick, miracles, and the Faery kingdom. The stag is also seen in the heraldry of the Knight of Pentacles and the King of Pentacles.

Dog: The dog is a traditional representation of the earth element. Dogs symbolize loyalty and companionship.

They add their support to the following cards: the Fool, Ten of Pentacles, and Queen of Pentacles.

Dragon: A creature of the element of fire, dragons represent the oldest of magicks and passion. Dragons are

seen in the Seven of Cups and Five of Wands, and are seen in the heraldry of the Six of Wands and Nine of Wands.

Dragonflies: As creatures of the air element, they symbolize illusion. Seen in the Five of Swords and Six of Swords.

Faeries: The faeries are associated with the elemental kingdom of the air and the suit of swords. They represent a deep connection to the magick of the natural world. Faeries are seen in the cards the Magician, IWo of Swords, Three of Swords, Five of Swords, and Queen of Swords.

Falcons and Hawks: These birds symbolize spiritual messages. Seen in the Ace of Swords, King of Swords, and Nine of Pentacles. They are in the heraldry of the Page of Swords and Knight of Swords.

Fish and Dolphin: These water creatures symbolize communication, emotion, intuition, and creativity.

They are seen on the Page of Cups, King of Cups, and Eight of Cups.

Gardens: Gardens are typically shown in the background of a scene. They are magickal places and represent where you are on your current spiritual path. Gardens are illustrated in the cards the Lovers, Three of Cups, Nine of Pentacles, Ten of Pentacles, and the Page of Pentacles. Globes or Orbs: These represent power over earthy matters and concerns. Seen in the following cards: the Emperor and TWO of Wands.

Heraldry: Heraldry is seen in several cards in the Witches Tarot deck. Each was chosen for its elemental association and magickal symbolism. (See individual entries for a listing of the cards they appear on.) Dragons (fire) mean protection, valor, and a defender of treasure. Hawks (air) mean eagerness, impatience, and the thrill of the chase. Lions (fire) indicate bravery, valor, and strength. Mermaids (water) symbolize eloquence, loyalty, and truth. Stags (earth) mean strategy, peace, and harmony.

Horses: Movement and strength, also associated with all four elements of earth, air, fire, and water. A divine symbol of the God and Goddess. Seen in the Chariot, Death, the Sun, Knight of Cups, Knight of Swords, Six of Wands, Knight of Wands, and Knight of Pentacles.

House: Home is where the heart is, and when houses—from cottages to turreted grand houses—are depicted in tarot cards, they are a symbol of the magick of family, security, and hearth and home. Houses are seen in Six of Cups, Ten of Cups, Four of Pentacles, and Ten of Pentacles.

Keys: Keys are a mystical symbol of knowledge and often represent the mysteries of the Craft. Seen in the High Priest and the Moon cards.

Lakes, Ponds, and Pools: The still water of a lake, pond, or pool reflects sunlight, moonlight, or our thoughts. Seen in many of the cards, including Temperance, the Star, Ace of Cups, TWO of Cups, IWo of Swords, Six of Swords, Eight of Wands, and Knight of Wands.

Lemniscate: The infinity symbol, which illustrates the cyclical nature of energy. Energy is always moving and always constant. The lemniscate is seen in the Magician, Strength, and TWO of Pentacles.

Lion: Strength, loyalty, courage, and restraint. Seen on the Strength and World cards and depicted in the . heraldry of the Knight of Wands and King of Wands cards.

Mermaids: Elemental creatures of water. Sexuality, intrigue, and longing. Seen on Four of Cups, Five of Cups, and Seven of Cups. The mermaid is also featured in the heraldry of the Knight of Cups and King of Cups.

Moon: Represents psychic power, feminine energy, mystery, magick, and intuition. Seen on the High Priestess, the High Priest, the Chariot, the Moon, Karma, Eight of Cups, TWO of Swords, and Nine of Swords.

Mountains: Mountains indicate that we must work to reach our goals and represent triumph, challenges, and endurance. Seen in many of the cards.

Ocean and Seas: Represent infinite possibilities, great depths of wisdom, mystery, something bigger and more powerful than ourselves. Seen in the Five of Cups, Eight of Cups, Page of Cups, Queen of Cups, King of Cups, Three of Wands, and TWO of Pentacles.

Pentagram: The upright five-pointed interwoven star represents the elements and spirit. It is often worn as a talisman for protection and as a charm by a Witch. Seen in the Fool (on his knapsack), the Magician, the High Priest, the Wheel of the Year, the Hanged Man, the Moon, Seven of Swords, and Nine of Wands.

Pillars: Pillars represent balance. Pillars are included in classic tarot imagery to illustrate that the figure of the card is neutral or has taken the middle ground. Seen in the High Priestess, the High Priest, and Justice.

Rainbow: A classic symbol of hope, messages, miracles, and magick. Seen in Temperance, Ten of Cups, and Seven of Cups.

Rivers and Streams: Rivers are considered to be the moving force of life. They tell of journeys and of opportunities; also, they represent flowing emotions and the stream of consciousness. Streams are a softer, gentler version of the meaning of the river. Rivers and

streams are seen in the Empress, Four of Cups, Six of Cups, Ten of Cups, Knight of Cups, Eight of Swords, Ace of Wands, and Knight of Pentacles.

-Rose: A magickal symbol of love, enchantment, and hope. In the language of flowers, the meanings vary according to the color of the rose. In this deck we see white, red, pink, and yellow roses. White are for love, unity, and beauty. Red indicate beauty, love, harmony, and charm. Pink are for friendship, romance, and affection. Yellow are for friendship and sunshine. Roses play prominently in the Fool, the Magician, the Lovers, Strength, TWO of Cups, Three of Cups, Queen of Cups, Four of Wands, and Queen of Pentacles.

Scepter: A masculine rod of power topped with an feminine orb, scepters are a symbol of sovereignty.

Scepters are seen in the Empress, the Emperor, King of

Cups, and King of Pentacles.

Shield: The shield is a tool of protection and was used as a sort of statement for the world to see, depending on the designs painted upon it. The shield is featured in the Empress, Knight of Swords, and Knight of Pentacles.

Ships: Ships represent travel and thoughts. Seen in the TWO of Wands, Three of Wands, Six of Swords, and Two of Pentacles.

Skulls: Skulls symbolize the promise of new life, change, and transition. The skull is considered to be the seat of inspiration and intelligence. A skull is seen in Death, the Moon, and the Eight of Pentacles.

Snow: Snow may indicate isolation or being crisp, clean, and new. Seen in the Hermit and Five of Pentacles.

Staff: A more earthy type of scepter. The staff is often used by a wise man or as a tool of the traveler. Seen in the Fool, the High Priest, and the Hermit.

Stained Glass: Stained glass represents perception alchemy. Seen in the Three of Pentacles.

Star: Stars indicate hope, destiny, illumination, and astrological influences. Seen in the High Priestess, the Empress, the Chariot, the Hermit, the Star, and Eight of Cups.

Sun: The masculine side of deity. Solar magick, strength, light, and power. Seen in the High Priest, the Lovers, the Sun, Karma, and Nine of Wands.

Sunflower: A flower of the sun and the element of fire that symbolizes success, fame, and riches. Featured in the Sun, Page of Wands, and Queen of Wands.

Teens or Young Adults: A young adult or teen portrayed in a tarot card symbolizes possibilities and discovery, and they mark the beginning of a quest for knowledge about the magickal world and about themselves. Teens or young adults are portrayed in this deck as the pages.

SYMBOLS IN TAROT CARDS

The masculine elements of air (swords suit) and fire (wands suit) both have male pages, while the suits of cups and pentacles (water and earth, respectively) are illustrated with female pages. You will find these young people in the following cards: the Fool, Page of Cups, Page of Swords, Page of Wands, Page of Pentacles, Two of Pentacles, and Three of Pentacles.

Throne: The throne symbolizes sovereignty and power.

Seen in the High Priestess, the Empress, the Emperor,
Queen of Cups, King of Cups, Queen of Swords, King of
Swords, Queen of Wands, King of Wands, Queen of
Pentacles, and King of Pentacles.

Triple Moon: The classic Witches' symbol of the Triple Goddess, or the Maiden, Mother, and Crone. Seen in the High Priestess and on the back of every tarot card in the Witches Tarot deck.

Mips: The tulip flower is used in prosperity magick and corresponds to the element of earth. In the language of flowers, tulips symbolize royalty and whisper of love. Tulips are seen in the Emperor, the Lovers, and the Queen of Pentacles.

Wand: A Magician's tool used to direct and focus personal power. Seen in the Magician and the Chariot.

Wand of Hawthorn: In this deck, the wand featured in the suit of wands is a blooming branch of hawthorn.

Hawthorn has the elemental association of fire; also,

the hawthorn is a tree of magickal power and folklore. Magickally, hawthorn blossoms are used in both protection and fertility spells. Seen in the Magician, the Wheel of the Year, and the entire suit of wands.

Waterfalls: Waterfalls signify the active and forceful flow of emotions and the stream of the subconscious— ideas and emotions that flow and change. Seen in the Empress, Three of Cups, and Four of Cups.

Waves: Waves are the movement of emotion. Seen in the Page of Cups, Three of Cups, Five of Cups, Queen of Cups, and King of Cups.

Wolf: A wolf signifies a pathfinder, leader, guide, and teacher. Seen in the Moon.
